### FRIDAY, MAY 31, 1895.

**CHAUTAUQUAN MUSICAL.**—The musical at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. A. S. Dresser at the corner of Fifth and John Quincy Adams streets, last Friday evening, was a grand affair, and thoroughly enjoyed by the upwards of one hundred and thirty Chautauquans and invited guests present. Mrs. Dresser, assisted by Miss Ana Baird, received the guests who were assigned to their places in the spacious parlors thrown open for the occasion; the floral decorations were appropriate and the high class program was appreciated in a delightfully social way by the auditors. First on the program was an overture by the orchestra, composed of Henry Fuchs cornetist, George Fuchs violinist, L. B. Moore, trombone, Henry Wolf flute, and A. S. Dresser pianist. No encores were responded to as several on the program desired to catch the 10:30 car for Portland, but the applause after the rendition of each number was enthusiastic. After the overture the following program was rendered: Vocal solo, "For all Eternity," by Miss Metta Brown, of Portland; piano solo, "Lohengren," fantasia from Wagner, by Mrs. E. E. Williams; vocal solo, selected, by Mr. Morrison; vocal solo, "The Huntsman's Horn," by Mrs. E. S. Miller of Portland; cornet solo, by Henry Fuchs, S. P. train dispatcher at Portland; vocal solo, by Mrs. H. Daniway of Portland; piano duet, by Misses Ora Spangler and Anna Samuel's of Corvallis; vocal solo "Hammer song," by Mrs. E. E. Charman; piano solo, selected, by Mrs. J. C. Read; vocal solo, "Angel's serenade," by Miss Neita N. Barlow; quartette by Capt. A. B. Graham, P. M. Waddell, G. H. Bestow and Lawrence Driggs, and a trombone solo by L. B. Moore. At the close of the musical program cake, water ices and ice cream were served, which had been prepared for the occasion by the lady members of the various Chautauqua circles in the city, and an hour passed most pleasantly in a social way.

**CLOSE BROTHERS HOME AGAIN.**—The Close brother, who were arrested last week by Sheriff Maddock and Chief Burns for alleged attempt at counterfeiting, and who were bound over in the sum of \$500 each, by Justice Dixon, were delivered over to the United States marshal on demand last Thursday evening. After spending a brief period in the Multnomah county jail, they were brought before United States Commissioner Paul R. Deady for examination. They came into the office of United States Attorney Murphy, a crestfallen lot, with the wives and families of two of

them. The government was represented by Assistant United States Attorney Schnabel. It was developed at the examination that there was no evidence against three of the brothers, so they were discharged. Al Close took the blame upon himself and tried to explain his possession of the counterfeit coins. He said the mutilated or diefigured coins were partially melted at a fire when his hotel was burned down a year or two ago. He had saved them since then. As quantities of block tin, brass, copper and antimony, articles necessary in the manufacture of counterfeit coins, were found in his possession, he was held by Commissioner Deady. But as the evidence against him was not very strong, he was permitted to go on his own recognizance and without bail. He is expected, however, to appear before the United States grand jury and explain matters.

**WILL SUE FOR FEES.**—Multnomah county is threatened with a mandamus suit in the shape of a claim for witness fees in the Rev. J. C. Read bank-robbery case says the Oregonian. When Read was tried the defense summoned about 30 witnesses from Oregon City and the surrounding country to testify as to Read's conduct in daily life. When it came to paying the witnesses fees the county objected to paying the time and mileage for 30 witnesses from here to Oregon City. An order was made to the effect that, in accordance with the law, but five witnesses were allowed compensation. The five witnesses so paid were supposed to be the first five regularly subpoenaed. The law provides that only five witnesses may be called for the defense at the state's expense in a criminal case unless at the instance of a court's special order. The witness's claim is, that they were subpoenaed in due legal form upon what they took to be the authority of Judge Stephen's court. They had no reason to believe but that their claims would be allowed, inasmuch as they were put to expense and trouble in obeying the summons they were making themselves liable for contempt of court. In that case, then, the officers would have been sent for them. The rule allowing fees only to the first five witnesses was established by the county court and was done upon the authority of the section of law governing fees. When the witnesses in the Read case heard of this rule they became indignant, and it is probable they will sue for their claims.

**REPUBLICAN LEAGUE REGISTER.**—Sample pages of the proposed Republican Register, to be compiled and published with the authority of the republican state central committee of the state of Oregon, and the state republican league of Oregon, has been received at this office. It is to be issued by the Register Publishing company, of Portland, Oregon. G. A. Steel, chairman of the republican state central committee in his circular letter to the republicans of Oregon says: "Deeming a record of the republican party in Oregon and a register of republicans who have taken an active part in managing its affairs in this state, would be of great value to the party in stimulating pride to the party's achievements, and lead to increased activity and enhanced zeal among its members, the state central committee have initiated the preparation of such a volume, and trusts that republicans generally will contribute towards the expense of publishing it." A similar letter is being sent out by B. B. Beekman, president of the young men's state republican club. This register will contain a list of members of the county central committee, a roster of the republican league of Oregon, and will be a complete record of the republican party in this state, and will form a register of the active republicans of the present as well as of former years, in fact everything of interest to republicans, lists of delegates, to conventions etc.

**OREGON COLONIZATION SOCIETY.**—The Oregon Colonization Society, Limited, of Portland, Eugene D. White, president, and George S. Batty secretary, will soon issue a monthly journal that will be distributed through the various states of the union, where the idea is prevalent of immigrating to regions with more favorable climatic conditions. The object is to induce a worthy class of people, who will purchase agricultural lands, to come here and aid in developing our somewhat latest resources. This journal will advertise the advantages of the various sections of the state, and a desirable class of immigration would give a new impetus to our commercial, agricultural and industrial interests.

**LECTURE AT SHIPLEY'S HALL.**—F. A. Falkenberg, head consul Pacific jurisdiction of the Woodmen of the World, will lecture at Shipley's hall this Friday evening. The committee on invitation is L. D. Taylor, F. E. Donaldson, R. Finley, Otto F. Olson and E. E. Martin. Everyone should hear this able speaker. The Hastings (Neb.) Republican says: "Mr. Falkenberg has shown himself to be a competent chopper and a rustler from 'way back' and is a gentleman whom it is a pleasure to meet. Large accessions are being made and the influence of this young but meritorious and rapidly growing order is rapidly increasing."

**NEW HATCHERY PROJECT.**—Henry Meldrum, who accompanied Fish Protector McGuire and Superintendent Hub-

hard of the Clackamas hatchery to the headwaters of the Clackamas on a tour of inspection, where it is proposed to erect a salmon hatchery, returned Friday. The point selected is about fifty-five miles from the mouth of the Clackamas and right in the heart of the Cascade range. There the Clackamas comes tumbling cold and clear from its source in the mountains, and spreads out over a broad plateau in deep pools, shallow gravelbottoms and gentle riffles—an ideal spawning ground. The Clackamas there carries almost as great a volume of water as it does at the government station, and is a beautiful stream. Below from the North Fork to Eagle creek, a stretch of many miles the stream runs through deep canyons in a series of cataracts and whirlpools that are inaccessible even to the most daring fishermen. The proposed hatchery will be built with the fund raised by the salmon canners.

**HABEAS CORPUS PROCEEDINGS.**—James Oliver, a conductor on the East Side Railway, was fined \$25 by Recorder Fouts last Monday for carrying freight into the city contrary to municipal ordinance. The defendant was allowed to go on his own recognizance, pending a decision from County Judge Hayes on the habeas corpus petition. The matter was argued Tuesday afternoon by H. E. Cross, attorney for the railway company, and E. F. Driggs, city attorney, before the county judge, who took the matter under advisement. Counsel for defendant claims that the complaint was defective, and by this reason the recorder did not have jurisdiction. The counsel for the city claims this court has no right to inquire into the sufficiency of the complaint. Oliver carried a package for a photographer and charged him 25 cents extra for the freight as excess baggage.

**PLATINUM DISCOVERED.**—Another valuable mineral has been discovered in Clackamas county. Platinum has been found on the farm of William Lewthwaite on the north bank of the Clackamas river, about three miles from town. The discovery was made by Frank Lewthwaite, a nephew of the owner of the place, who is visiting his uncle, and having had some experience in mining in California, concluded to do a little prospecting. The result was he discovered traces of platinum, and several grains of the mineral was sent to San Francisco for assay, and the returns proved most encouraging. The report of the assayer pronounced it platinum, and worth looking after. The prospecting is now being conducted systematically, and it is not improbable that a rich mine of the precious metal will be found.
