and Cows Through the flush of milk yield there a a dangerous tendency to be guarded against that is found both on the farm and in the factory. It is a relaxation of vigilance in taking care of milk and in

manufacturing it. Through the increased amount of milk handled those who extract it from the cows on the farm and those who make it up at the factory, imperceptibly perhaps, do not take as much pains with A No. I Stock Ranch. the separate processes as though the

amount were less. The reason of this is that the increased volume increases the labor entailed, and the tax on physical endurance causes a yield in the picket line of vigilance. Many dairymen and cheesemakers seem to be perfectly unaware that they are less cautious now than when their la bors were not so ardnous, and perhaps if they have plenty of help to equalize

the work they are not so. In one way nature helps the cheesethan she doe the raw producer on the farm. Milk from grass feed resolves itself into cheese more naturally and with less attention to details in making than earlier in the

season, when it is less in amount. On the other hand, as the milk on the farm increases in yield under the stimulus of grass, nature does less to preserve its quality, and man must do more along this line, which, as I have intimated, he often fails to perform. More than ever will it pay us to be on our guard in all these little details this sea-

There is no knowing to what a depth dairy prices may tumble to before 1894 is gone, and of course the best quality Ten Acres, in butter, cheese and milk will stay

longest at the top. To illustrate what some of these little details are around the dairy premises that you may forget in the rush of doing summer chores, let me quote a few, with

their effects: When you carry the big milk can down to the stable before the evening milking, it is likely to be hot enough to feel blistering to the touch, from standing in the rays of the sun all day. By putting fresh milk into it in such a condition you simply invite it to spoil be

fore morning. The can should be cooled off by a dash 100 of cold water from the well or spring, and trivial though the act may seem it may save the quality of the milk stored

> If you heat the cows badly before milking, when their udders are heavy with the accumulated lactcal fluid, it doesn't do much good to cool the milk off afterward, so far as repairing damage


