**MORE TROUBLE.**—The old adage, "That troubles never come singly," has been verified in the case of E. C. Hamilton, who was arrested last Monday evening on a charge of obtaining property under false pretenses. The complaint was made by Miss Belle Hibbard, a teacher of this county, and daughter of O. F. Hibbard. From the statement of Mr. Hibbard, it appears that Mr. Hamilton had endorsed a note for the former, amounting to \$600, and when it became due last December she was unable to meet the payment. Miss Hibbard had saved up a few hundred dollars she earned as a school teacher, which she had invested in a tract of land at Clackamas, and to save Mr. Hamilton from suffering her father's delinquency, she decided the property to the former with the understanding that he was to withhold the same from record until the notes were delivered. Mr. Hibbard states that the notes were never turned over to him and that two days after the deed was executed it was filed for record, but the notes never came into the hands of the grantor. April 13th Hamilton gave a quit claim deed to the property to James Wilson, and in the assignment deed recently to C. O. T. Williams the notes in question are listed among the liabilities, but Hibbard has not been in anywise released from the obligation to pay these notes. Mr. Hamilton was released on his own recognizance, and will have a hearing before Justice Dixon Saturday, when his side of the story will be given.

**DEEP CREEK WILL CELEBRATE.**—The live citizens of Deep creek and adjacent country have completed arrangements to celebrate the Fourth of July in patriotic style, and those who attend can be assured of spending a most pleasant day. The exercises will be held in a beautiful grove near the Deep creek school house, and the surroundings are admirably adapted for a splendid day's outing in the country. Superintendent H. S. Gibson has accepted the invitation to deliver the oration, Leander Bartley will read the declaration, and the officers of the day are J. Gordon president, and E. H. Burghardt grand marshal. There will be a basket dinner, match game of base ball, fat man's race, three-legged race, fourteen-year old girl race, and recitations, songs, etc., in the afternoon. In addition to the other amusements, there will be dancing on the platform in the afternoon and evening.

**PRESS ASSOCIATION MEETING.**—Last Saturday morning Albert Tozier, secretary of the Oregon Press Association, accompanied by E. L. E. White and H. G. Mathies, members of the association, passed through Oregon City on the Roseburg local bound for Yaquina bay, where they went to make arrangements for the annual meeting of the press association. On their return Monday Mr. Tozier stated that they were joined by L. L. Campbell, of the Eugene Guard, at Albany, and at Corvallis Superintendent Charles Clark, of the O. C. & E. railroad and Postmaster Johnson were added to the list, and who accompanied them to Newport. The citizens of that place expressed active interest in the meeting, and arrangements were made with the hotels to reserve rooms for 150 persons and the rates were placed at \$1 and \$1.50 per day. July 20th was selected as the date for holding the annual session, which will continue four days.

**IN JUSTICE DIXON'S COURT.**—Tuesday, J. A. Louisignont gave bonds in the sum of one hundred dollars to keep the peace. He was arrested on complaint of H. O. Jones, of Clackamas Heights, who established the fact that he had threatened to shoot the complaining witness. On the same day Charles Linn was arraigned for assault on the person of J. J. Pankey, of Clackamas. A jury trial was demanded, which resulted in his acquittal. Saturday morning at 10 o'clock E. C. Hamilton will have a hearing on the charge of obtaining property under false pretenses, and was released on his own recognizance to appear, when the arrest was made Monday. Herrington and Reinbold, the Walla Walla emigrants who were arrested for forcing their way through the Barlow toll road without paying toll, were finally permitted to go on their way to the Siletz reservation, after paying costs amounting to \$20.

**THE EXCURSION.**—About forty Oregon City people gathered at the depot early Monday morning to join the conductor's excursion to Salem, and about a hundred more were on hand to see the trains pass. Three trains passed in succession, and the cars were completely filled with excursionists and all the available standing room on the platforms and steps was occupied. Only about one-half of the Oregon City contingent were able to get on the cars comfortably, and the remainder had to spend the day at home. It is estimated that from 3,000 to 4,000 people went up on the east side, and baggage cars and unused sleepers were pressed into service as passenger cars. It is estimated that at least 8,000 people visited Salem Sunday, and the excursion was the grandest affair of the kind ever given in the Willamette valley.

**LOST IN THE WOODS.**—A story comes from Clackamas that an old lady who lives at that place went out to gather wild strawberries last week, accompanied by two small children. During the afternoon they rambled around and became lost in the woods, where they night overtook them. The old lady imagined she heard the growl of a bear or some other wild animal and took refuge on the top of a high log holding a child with each arm, where they remained all night. When they did not return home much uneasiness was felt as to their whereabouts and safety, and a search party was organized, who discovered the missing berry hunters only a few miles from home about ten o'clock in the morning, a little the worse for a night's outing against blankets.
