OUR GOOD ROADS.

The road work for this season has about closed. The general report is that there has been more work done on the roads in Clackamas county this year than in any previous year.

The good results of having a road engineer to superintend the road work of the county is very apparent. The improvement of the roads is now carried on in a systematic manner in strong contrast to the slipshod methods employed under the old supervisor system.

A number of the main highways of Clackamas county are now getting to be in fair condition to travel, and the county can boast of several miles of graded roads equal to any in the older states.
