Since the addition of the Gray Eagle to Oregon City Transportation Company's line of boats, several changes have been made in the personnel of the different boats. Captain Newton Graham, who has been pilot on the Altona, is now captain on the Gray Eagle, and Captain Spong who has been on the Ramona, is transferred to the Altona. Captain Arthur Graham is pilot and purser on the steamer Altona. Ed Wynkoop, who was purser on the Altona, now has charge of the Oregon City dock.

Miss Edna Taber returned to her home at Mt. Pleasant Tuesday from an extended visit to Forest Grove. Miss Taber had a narrow escape from being killed or seriously hurt on the Fourth. It appears that she, in company with three other young people were in a back driving to Hillsboro when the team became frightened and backed the vehicle off a bridge into a ravine. Two of the occupants jumped and saved themselves, but Miss Taber and one of the young men were thrown to the bottom of the ravine, a distance of thirty feet. Fortunately they each escaped with slight injuries. The team did not go over but broke loose from the vehicle and ran away.

At the meeting of the executive committee of the state agricultural board in Salem last Saturday, the appointments were made for the superintendents of the various divisions of the next state fair. The following persons from Clackamas were given positions: Richard Scott, of Milwaukie, was appointed superintendent of division B—cattle. On special exhibits J. T. Apperson, J. G. Pillsbury and H. Many Grand Army men will be present and the day promises to be the great day of the assembly. The program for the exercises of the day will please both old and young.

They were bound over in the sum of five thousand dollars to appear before the U. S. grand jury. His horses became frightened and ran away with the wagon throwing him out breaking his left leg and three of his ribs. He was brought to his home from the mountains Tuesday, and his condition is serious from the fact that he is 68 years old, and his system received a severe shock from the injuries. These mines are owned by the Blue River Mining & Milling company, composed of a number of Oregon City's solid citizens.
