**COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.**

**July Term—Gordon E. Hayes, Judge; Richard Scott and Frank Jaggard Commissioners.**

In the matter of the report of viewers for damages on the Burnett change in the Foster and Milwaukee road, and expense account of \$13.80 allowed, also a warrant ordered drawn in favor of George Foreman for \$5 damages.

In the matter of the report of viewers for damages on the Miller change in the P. Lewis road, the expense account of \$12.40 was allowed, and the consideration of damages postponed until the August term.

An order was made that all county warrants issued more than seven years prior July 1st, 1895, which have been taken from the clerk's office, but still remain unpaid, that notice be published as by law required that said warrants will be cancelled off record, and payment of same refused.

In the matter of the petition of the Courier and other papers for the county printing to be let by contract, the court claimed that they did have the power of selecting the paper in which the delinquent tax-list is published, and it was ordered that said petition be denied.

F. A. Meinig, of Cascades precinct, was granted a liquor license to sell spirituous liquors in less quantities than one gallon for a period of six months.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of E. S. Calkins, et al, for a county road, the same was approved, road ordered opened, and expense account of 12.50 allowed.

The petition of S. B. Johnson, et al, for a change in the Winston and Union school house road and the report of viewers was read and approved, and expense account of \$16 allowed.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of J. H. Revenue et al, for a county road, the expense account of \$48 was allowed, and claim for damages filed. William Boring, M. Remisenger and E. S. Bramhall were appointed viewers of damages to meet on the premises of William Raupach.

In the matter of the petition of A. Longnecker for viewers to locate a county road it was referred to the roadmaster to report at the August term.

In the matter of insuring the suspension bridge, it was ordered that the proposition of the Home and Phoenix insurance companies, to insure the structure for three years for \$10,000 at a premium of \$60 be accepted.

It was ordered that the county clerk advertise for bids for 50 cords of wood for the court house.
