Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Straub. Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The university offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:-An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English: An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy: A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer: A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. 
