

HE FAVORS CUBA.

A Chicago Divine Says the Time for Interference Has Come.

CUBANS PATRIOTS, NOT REBELS.

It is for America to Say that the Oppression of Cuba by Spain Must End.

CHICAGO, Sept. 22.—The Rev. Dr. W. H. Thomas caused something of a sensation this morning, by declaring from his pulpit that the time had come for America to say that the oppression of Cuba by Spain must come to an end. There was a large attendance of the best people of the city, and the speaker was frequently interrupted by outbursts of applause. Dr. Thomas said in part:

"Among the modern nations of the earth Spain is the oldest. She was once in the foreground, one of the greatest and proudest and most prosperous of nations; but she was always on the side of royalty and ecclesiasticism. She belonged to the old order of government and religion. Other nations, however, have advanced; heard the call and caught the inspiration of a new light, while Spain has stood still—has gone backward. She has not absorbed other peoples of the earth, and caught inspiration from them. Her religion is Roman Catholic, and is supported by the state. No fault can be found with that. She has a right to her religion, which is one of the great wings or powers of the church. The Protestant religion is tolerated, but worship must be in secret, and no notice of meetings must be given. There are 60,000 Protestants in the country, and an attendance at worship of 5000 in a population of less than 16,000,000. There are 5,000,000 men and 7,800,000 women who cannot read and write. Education flourishes in England, Germany, France, Italy, and therefore, I argue that Spain—this moribund nation that has failed to get into line with the practice of this great age—has forfeited the right to be a dictator, much less a ruler among the nations of the earth. It has the right to exist in ignorance and superstition, and to manage its own affairs, but not the right to cruelly oppress its own subjects.

"The time has come for America to say that this oppression of Cuba must come to an end, and that very soon. All our memories are on the side of freedom. When we struggled for freedom France held out a helping hand, and Russia sent warships to cruise off New York. Can we stand still and let Spain crush the life out of these struggling patriots? I do not call them rebels. They are patriots, as brave as men ever were, and are struggling for the rights of men, as we once struggled. Governments move slowly, but there is now need to deliver an expression of our sympathy. It is fitting that the voice of the pulpit, the press and the people of this great city, the center of the country, should be heard first."

Cuba to Have a Navy.

NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—According to the reports current among those interested in Cuban affairs, the patriots are in a fair way to have a navy the first of the year. It is positively asserted by those who claim to be conversant with the facts that Cuba will have the rights of belligerency accorded her by Mexico and several South American republics before a month has passed. Facilities for coal stations will be provided for the patriot navy and all vessels sailing under letters of marque issued by the officials of the republic of Cuba.

ORIENTAL ADVICES.

Japan Preparing to Issue Bonds for a War Loan.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 24.—According to Japanese papers brought by the steamship Empress of India, the government has under consideration a proposal to issue bonds for the \$100,000,000 war loan approved by the diet at the last session. The amount expended on the war was nearly 150,000,000 yen.

The Salvation Army has commenced war on Japan. Lieutenant Eshajune, a Japanese has charge of the forces in Japan.

On the 10th inst., 662 fresh cases of cholera and 476 deaths were reported in Japan. Up to September 6, 38,928 cases and 25,756 deaths have occurred since the outbreak of the plague.

Eighteen Russian convicts who escaped from Saghalin, have been arrested by Japanese police near Hakodate. Five escaped again from prison, but the remaining 13 were handed over to the Russian consul, and sent to Saghalin.

There is a marked decrease in the number of fresh cases of cholera in Tokio. During the 24 hours ending September 12 at noon, only 19 cases were recorded, whereas 40 or 50 had been reported a few days ago. If things continue in this state the disease will be stamped out before long, at least as far as Tokio is concerned. In Yokohama, two more cases occurred on the 11th, while in Osaka it has almost disappeared and marines, who have been prohibited to land in consequence of the spread of cholera, are now free to visit the shore. In Okayama Ken, the malady which was once so virulent has greatly diminished, but dysentery, on the other hand, is showing signs of spreading.

NIAGARA PAYS IT.

MANGUA, Nicaragua, Sept. 24.—All but \$2500 of the \$77,500 which Great Britain exacted from Nicaragua in May last for the expulsion of Consular Agent Hatch and other citizens

of the paper had at one time been dropped in the mud.

No endorsement appears on the back of the check, and the face shows the mark of no cancellation stamp, demonstrating that the check has never been presented for payment. The check was no doubt forwarded to the Northwest before the news of the Coster massacre reached Washington. It has evidently been under shelter somewhere, and the chances are that it was lost recently and swept out into the street, where it was found by Mr. Francis.

THE CRUISER BARCASTEGUI.

She Was Sunk by a Torpedo and not in Collision—A Different Explanation.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 22.—An entirely different explanation of the sinking of the Spanish cruiser Barcastegui and the loss of 46 lives in the harbor of Havana, last Wednesday night, is made in letters received in this city today by a distinguished member of the revolutionary party. According to the news telegraphed from Havana the day after, the catastrophe was due to a collision between the cruiser and a merchant steamer. It is now stated as an absolute fact that the cruiser was sunk by a floating torpedo, launched by an adventurous party of Cubans. The Cuban leader who sent the news said:

"The Spanish government knows full well what sunk its best cruiser, and sent to their deaths Admiral Delgado Perea, in command of the Spanish navy in Cuban waters, seven officers and 39 men. We know here that before the dispatch relating to the accident was sent it was carefully edited by the press-censor.

"The advice which I have received says that Monday night a party of ten Cubans, under command of Captain Carlos Enrique, left Guantanamo in a steam launch, with a torpedo, which was so constructed that it could be launched some distance away from the object aimed to be destroyed, and then, by a piece of clockwork, exploded in about 15 minutes after it was sent out. The party on the launch had received this torpedo only about a week ago. Captain Enrique selected a point about 200 yards from the wharf, from which to launch the torpedo. It was slipped out and as soon as it was gone Captain Enrique gave orders to steam away as rapidly as possible.

"The work of the torpedo was even more speedy than was anticipated. Not five minutes elapsed before it exploded with a report that was heard several miles away. From what those on board say it must have exploded about 40 feet away from the cruiser and struck her in the starboard side. It is true the merchant steamer Motera was near the vessel at the time, and that she, too, suffered damage, but it was not serious, and if the men on board of her had kept their heads they might have saved some of the lives of those on board the cruiser."
