FRUIT GROWERS' UNION.

That there is profit as well as strength in union has been clearly proven by many fruit growers of Oregon during the past season.

The growing of fruit did not really become a profitable, settled industry in California until the fruitmen united their interests and formed unions through which to market their crops.

The matter of freight alone is of sufficient importance to make the maintaining of unions imperative. There are but few fruit growers that can load a car of one variety of fruit at a time, and if compelled to ship in small quantities the freight charges absorb all the profits.

If the fruit growers of Clackamas county are to compete successfully in the markets of the country they will have to organize and be able to handle their crop as a unit.
