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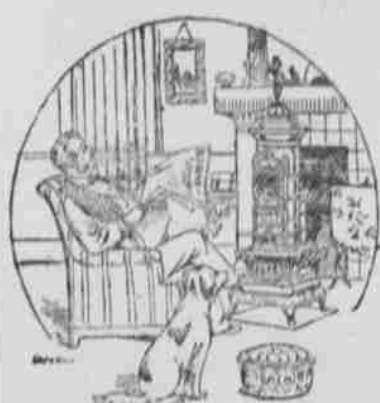

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THE UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oregon, offers free tuition to all students. Young men can obtain board, lodging, heat and light in the dormitory for \$2.50 per week. Roomers furnish their own linen. Young women are provided with board in private families at \$3.00 per week. Young women desiring board should address Prof. John Straub, Eugene, Oregon; or Secretary Young Women's Christian Association, Eugene. The university offers three baccalaureate degrees, Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science and Bachelor of Letters with corresponding courses of study. The following shorter courses are also offered:—An English course leading in two years to a business diploma and in three years to the title graduate in English:—An advanced course for graduates of normal schools leading to the degree master of pedagogy: A three years' course in civil engineering leading to the degree civil engineer: A course of two years for teachers of physical education leading to a diploma and the title director of physical education. The University charges an incidental fee of ten dollars which is payable in advance by all students. Students holding diplomas from the public schools and those having teachers' certificates are admitted to the preparatory department without examination. RULES FOR PROMOTIONS.

In order to give a stronger incentive to the scholars in the schools of Oregon City, the board has adopted a new set of rules to govern promotions. By them the necessity of spending a week or more at the close of the term in examination work is dispensed with, the students taking their standing from their monthly averages. The following are the rules, as adopted:

Any pupil in the grammar or the high school departments who attained an average of 90 per cent. in daily recitations for the term in any branch, may be promoted without examination in that branch.

Any pupil in the primary department who attains an average of 85 per cent. in daily recitation for the term in any branch may be promoted without examination in that branch;

Provided, that no pupil whose department for the term is less than 85 per cent. shall be exempt from examination.

Pupils in the high school, in order to be promoted, must make an average of 80 per cent. in examination and not fall below 60 per cent in any one branch.

Pupils in grammar and primary grades, in order to be promoted, must make an average of 75 per cent. in examination, and not fall below 60 per cent in any one branch.

WEST OREGON CITY SCHOOLS.

The enrollment of the West Oregon City schools for the month of September reached 118. The attendance during the first part of the month was not so regular as might be wished, though now there is no ground for complaint on this score, and the interest on the part of the pupils seems to be genuine and is resulting in faithful work. We lack reference books, so it is not possible for pupils to do as thorough and exhaustive work as is desirable, yet with our new International Encyclopedia, which will be in place in a short time, we feel that the reference library is established and will grow to be all the school may need. The list of visitors is not a long one, yet we are grateful that so many have found their way to the school building and trust that some member of every family represented in the school may come and see what is being done. Pupils are more enthusiastic in their work when they see that parents are sufficiently interested to visit the school. We summarize as follows for September: C. W. LIST OF TEACHERS AND SCHOOLS.

Below is given the names of the teachers now in charge of schools in Clackamas county together with the number of the districts and the names of the clerks with their postoffice address. The list as will be seen is not quite complete, as in some of the districts school has not yet commenced while in other cases Superintendent Gibson has been unable to secure the name of the teacher. Owing to there being no law compelling district clerks or teachers to report when school begins in a district it has been a tedious matter to prepare this list and it has required considerable time on the part of Supt. Gibson to make it up. It would not be much of an effort on the part of the teachers to notify the superintendent as to where and when they are to teach, so that at all times he could have an accurate list of all the districts having teachers, thus enabling him to know what districts were not supplied. By keeping such a list much time could be saved the teachers in looking for positions as well as annoyance to the school board in replying to applications after a teacher had been secured. Another advantage would be that the superintendent would know when the various schools would begin, and could arrange his visits so as to avoid loss of time in traveling over the county.
