CIRCUIT COURT. November Term Convened—A Sensible Charge to the Grand Jury.

Circuit court for Clackamas county convened Monday morning, November 4th; Hon. T. A. McBride judge, W. N. Barrett, prosecuting attorney; E. C. Maddock, sheriff, and George H. Horton, clerk. T. W. Fouts was appointed court room bailiff, Max Schulplins, grand jury bailiff and T. M. Miller, petit jury bailiff.

The list of jurors was called and the following answered to the roll call: Frank Ford, A. B. Marquam, John H. Broetje, William Johnson, C. A. Halstrom, A. S. Lawton, J. K. Miller, J. E. McConnell, H. Iderhoff, A. J. Thompson, C. C. Williams, George C. Armstrong, J. E. Milts, W. H. Myers, J. F. Nelson, John R. Duncan, M. Robbins, C. F. Clarke, Christ Fischer, H. S. G. Phelps, P. A. Baker, John Lewellen, J. F. Eckerason, E. I. May, G. W. Prosser, V. L. Mack, E. I. Story, John Boylan, J. E. Mitts, E. C. Haskett was excused, and F. A. Bohm and H. E. Smith were out of the state.

The following were drawn as a grand jury: John Lewellen, J. E. Mitts, A. J. Thompson, J. F. Nelson, A. B. Marquam, J. E. McConnell and P. A. Baker. John Lewellen was appointed foreman. V. L. Mack was excused from service on the grand jury on account of sickness and business.

Judge McBride made a lengthy charge to the grand jury, in which he made a departure from the usual mode of procedure and scored some strong points in favor of economy in court and county expenditures. It is usually customary for the grand jury to examine witnesses for the prosecution only, in all criminal charges brought before that body, but Judge McBride instructed the jury to call in and examine the witnesses for the defense as well as the state, also to call in the accused especially if he was a prisoner or in attendance upon the court and allow him to testify in his own behalf. By this means no unnecessary indictments will be returned and the county will be saved much useless expense. He also cautioned the jury that when trivial assault or trespass cases were brought to their attention, to first inquire if the complaints had been heard before a local magistrate; that it was a great saving for the county to have such cases tried before a justice of the peace, as the expense attendant on holding circuit court amounts to about \$125 per day. He, however, told them to use their discretion in such matters, and to be careful of returning indictments in cases where parties secretly went before the grand jury and made complaint against individuals, to give vent to petty malice or spite; that in such cases it often cost from \$15 to \$20 to secure a witness from a distance, and often the consequent trial in the circuit court amounts to nothing, and needless expense is incurred. The Judge further told them if they were at a loss to know the law in certain cases brought to their attention, that if they would submit a written statement of the matter, inserting fictitious names, that he would give them the proper instructions. The Judge, also instructed the grand jury to make a special examination of the condition of the county offices and the expenditures being made by the county.

At 12 o'clock noon the Judge announced that the petit jury would be discharged until next Monday morning, November 11th at half past nine o'clock. This will give the grand jury time to complete its labors and the court is busy with equity cases. In the afternoon the petit jury and numerous witnesses departed for their homes, and the court house presented a somewhat deserted appearance in contrast to the crowd that thronged the corridors and court room in the morning.
