**SPECIAL COUNCIL MEETING**—A special meeting of the city council was called Tuesday evening for general business. Mayor Straight was in the chair and there were present T. W. Fouts, recorder; C. E. Burns, chief of police, and councilmen Porter, Stevens, Moffatt, Broughton and Howell. On motion E. F. Driggs was allowed \$50 for legal services in the suit of Oregon City vs East Side Railway Company, which Judge McBride had decided in favor of the latter. A motion carried that a committee consisting of Stevens, Moffatt and Broughton to decide as to the advisability of employing additional legal talent and appealing the case to the supreme court. Motion carried that L. L. Porter use his own discretion as to stipulating with H. E. Cross for a withdrawal of the suit of Robert Kelland vs Parsons, et al, now pending in the circuit court. On motion L. L. Porter was allowed \$50 for legal services in the suit of Oregon City vs East Side Railway. C. D. Latourrette, attorney for the city in the ejectment suits now pending for collection of delinquent Main street assessments, asked for certified copies of all proceedings relating to the Main street improvement, which request was granted. Councilman Moffatt presented a minority report of the committee, to whom was referred the petition not to grant license to any saloon within 125 feet of a church or school building in Oregon City, in which he stated that the people who had signed this petition were honorable and responsible citizens, and worthy of consideration. He, therefore recommended that the prayer of the petitioners be granted. The mayor declared the minority report out of order for the reason that the other members of the committee, Cooke and Broughton had not submitted a majority report. It is likely, however, that a complete committee report will be presented at the next regular meeting. Before the council meeting convened several of the members were discussing the sermons delivered in several of the churches last Sunday night. They claimed that they had been misrepresented as to making flippant remarks concerning the petition under consideration at the regular meeting last week. All that was said derogatory to the said petition was laid on Cooke, but he was not present to defend himself.

**EXPERTS AT THE COURT HOUSE**—The grand jury has appointed E. C. Hackett as expert to examine and report upon the books of the county officers. He is assisted in his work by Mrs. C. E. Nash. They have been very busy with the records for the past week, and it will take another week to complete the work. Mr. Hackett is principal of the Canemah school, and held the position of chief deputy under C. W. Ganong during his incumbency of the sheriff's office. Mr. Hackett is capable and familiar with Clackamas county records, but it is not likely that he will find any serious discrepancies. The Canemah school is having a two week's vacation and Miss Sade Chase, teacher of the primary department and the pupils are getting a brief respite from their labors. Mrs. Nash is an expert book-keeper and has had considerable experience in county records, having been employed at different times on record work at the court house, and is fully competent for the position.

**GETS SIX YEARS**—Walter Janney, a former well known resident of Oregon City, was sentenced to six years in the penitentiary last Saturday by Judge Stephens of the Multnomah county circuit court. Janney plead guilty to robbing the residence of Mr. Miller. He was also concerned in robbing the residence of Rev. Roland Grant's house. An indictment against Erank King, charging him with being an accomplice with Janney in the robbery of the Miller resi-

dence, was dismissed, for the reason that King turned state's evidence, although his services in this direction were not required when Janney also admitted to his guilt. Charles E. Jones who was also concerned in these larcenies, was convicted and sentenced in Marion county for eight years in the penitentiary. The indictments charging the robbery of the residence of Rev. were dismissed as to Janney and King. Last Saturday James Thorne, of this city, at Janney's request, wrote to the latter's aged father in New Jersey, informing him of his son's fate.

**Mrs. Dye's Lecture**—Tuesday's Portland Telegram has the following: At the First Congregational church last night, Mrs. C. H. Dye, of Oregon City, addressed the Historical Society on "Noted Indian Chiefs." Mrs. Dye's discourse dealt with the relations of the most noted chiefs of early Oregon with the early settlers among the whites, and particularly Peu-peu-Mox-mox, the famous head of the Walla Wallas, and his son, the educated young Elijah; also Tahtitan, Five Crows, Tilloukalt, Kamalakik, the Tecumseh of the coast, and Chief Joseph. Mrs. Dye's address was enlivened with interesting reminiscences of the days when the white settlers invaded this country and some of the thrilling scenes of early days were vividly portrayed.

**THE SALOON LIMIT**—Portland has an ordinance prohibiting a saloon within 400 feet of a schoolhouse. Recently, at the instigation of a saloon-keeper who wanted to secure a new location, the council reduced the limit to 320 feet, but so great was the protest from the law and order element that last week the council restored the original 400-foot limit.
