County Court.

County court convened Wednesday morning, County Judge Hayes presiding, and present Commissioners Scott and Jagger. There is an unusually large number of prominent citizens in attendance on the county court this week from all parts of the county. There are petitions for changes in the boundaries of voting precincts, changes in the appointment of road supervisors and other matters demanding attention. All day Wednesday was occupied in hearing road petitions and kindred matters. Today, (Friday) the populist citizens of Clackamas county will be out in representative force before the county court asking that they have one representative on each election board in the county. The matter will be thoroughly discussed, and the court will give all parties interested a respectful hearing.

Mrs. Henrietta Kelly, who resides on the west side of the river about two miles from Oregon City, appeared before the court, and wanted damages on account of her fences being destroyed by fire while the improvements were under way last summer on the Oregon City and Shipley road. While the work of improving this road was under way, brush and logs were piled up on one side where the road passes through Mrs. Kelly's premises, some one set a heap of logs on fire, which communicated with a rail fence destroying a number of rails. Consequently, Mrs. Kelly wants the county to pay for the loss of the rails and damages sustained by reason of the cows walking in and eating the tops of five acres of growing potatoes. Mrs. Kelly pleaded her cause eloquently but the court remained unmoved. She claimed that the county's agents had negligently been the direct or indirect cause of her loss of fence and potatoes; that the county had spent much money foolishly, and thought that they should recompense a poor woman who had been a lone widow for 20 years. The court still remained obdurate at the latest reports.

Probate Court.

W. A. Hedges, J. P. Lovett and E. A. Sommer have been appointed appraisers of the estate of J. K. Bingham, deceased.

In the matter of the estate of Whalen C. Groff, deceased, the administrator was given until March 1st, to file appraisal and inventory of the property belonging to the estate.

Charles Albright, Jr., was appointed administrator of the estate of F. M. Albright, deceased. The estate is valued at over \$2,000.

In the matter of the minor heirs of D. J. and Mary Swartz, deceased, W. J. Currin, guardian, made his final report, and was discharged from further liability.

Republican Rally.

The republicans of Maple Lane will hold a rally at the Maple Lane school house on Saturday evening, January 18, at which time the officers for the ensuing year will be elected. The meeting will be addressed by H. S. Strange, of Oregon City who is known as a well posted and ready speaker. The public, regardless of party, is invited to be present.

The number of pioneers who have died in and around Oregon City, vastly outnumbers the list of any previous year. No less than nine persons have died during the past year, who have been intimately connected with the progress of Oregon City during the past forty years. Among them are Mrs. L. Comer, Hiram Cochran, Joseph Ferguson, R. L. Spencer, Joseph Hedges, H. B. May, James K. Bingham, E. M. Albright and J. C. Hackett. E. R. Charman, although not a pioneer, was prominent in the business interests of Oregon City. The majority of those above named came to Oregon City when the country was comparatively a wilderness, and lived to see the beginning of a great manufacturing city on the bank of the Willamette.

Republican Clubs Meet.

Saturday evening of this week a republican rally will be held at Batorf's hall, in Willamette Falls, where a club will be organized and delegates elected to the state league. The meeting will be addressed by Hon. Geo. C. Brownell and some short speeches by other well known speakers will be given. Those attending from this city can take the electric car which leaves the depot at 7:15 p. m. returning at 10 o'clock.

Wednesday evening of next week the Young Men's Republican club of Oregon City will meet at Pope's hall for the purpose of electing officers for the ensuing year and to choose delegates to the state league. Short, pointed addresses will be heard from a number of leading republican speakers.

Thursday evening of next week the club at Canby will hold a big rally at Knight's hall. After officers are elected for the ensuing year and delegates chosen to the state league, H. S. Strange of Oregon City will deliver an address.

Saturday evening, January 18, the Maple Lane club will hold a grand rally at the Maple Lane school house. The address of the evening will be by H. S. Strange, after which officers for the ensuing year will be elected and delegates named to the state league.

On Saturday evening January 25 the New Era club will hold a big rally at Leland's school house. Hon. Geo. C. Brownell will address the meeting. The members are preparing to make this rally an event in the history of the club. To all these club meetings the general public is cordially invited, irrespective of party, for republicans always keep open doors.

The poultry show will be held in the roomy building on the corner of First and Taylor streets. Entries are coming in rapidly and it is estimated that there will be 1000 choice fowls on exhibition. It is said that birds will be brought from as far east as Indiana, and to assist the management the express companies have agreed to reduce the transportation rates one-half on all first class birds, and some of the river boats agree to carry them both ways free of charge. Clackamas county should have a good representation of her choice breeds of fowls, as this county leads in that line.

The bar fixtures are not excelled in design and finish by any saloon in Portland. The bar itself is of solid oak, handsomely carved, while back of it is a plate glass mirror of very large size and beauty. Beer, of which only the best makes will be carried, will be drawn from a marble fountain, the beer being forced from the cold storage room by hydraulic pressure so that it is always cool and fresh. There are no gambling rooms or deadfalls in the rear of this saloon and none are ever tolerated for they propose, and always have kept a clean, orderly place where a respectable person could take a drink and go about his business. It is strictly a gentlemen's resort, for no rough characters are allowed about the premises.

Deputy District Attorney Rice took charge of the prosecution, and J. U. Campbell represented the defense. The jury, composed of J. K. Worthington, Jacob Lee, R. F. Straus, George Smith, D. W. Kellogg and James Coon, rendered a verdict of not guilty.

That part of Seventh street between Main and the Southern Pacific railroad track is an awful condition, and a little more traffic would make it impassable for teams.
