### CITY WATER SUPPLY.

Report of Water Commissioners for the Six Months Ending Dec. 31, 1895.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and City Council of Oregon City, Oregon.

We respectfully submit the following report of the business and condition of the water works as required by the charter under section 122.

During the year we have laid 1044 ft. of 4 in. main, 72 ft. of 10 in., 14 ft. of 2 in., 840 ft. of 3/4 in., 208 ft. of 1 in., besides the necessary bends, T's, etc., and have tapped the mains for 33 services.

Both pumps have been run continuously since last August, made possible by a change in the mains, whereby the Union pump supplies the hill mains at a pressure of 140 lbs., and the Worthington pump the down town mains at a pressure of from 70 to 80 lbs. Better service is given to both sections of the city, which allows both pumps to run at a slow speed and greatly lessening the wear and tear consequent on high speeds. The Board expects, soon, to prepare plans for a reservoir to be built for use this coming summer, when it will then be possible to shut down the pumps in case of any necessary repairs, and also greatly relieve them during the sprinkling season.

The total revenue derived from water rent since May 23, 1891 to December 31, 1895, has been \$21,656.50.

The city is supplied with water for fire protection to 50 hydrants, besides flush tanks for the sewer system.

There are no unpaid claims against the commission.

The bonded indebtedness is \$10,000 of 10 year, six per cent bonds having eight years yet to run.

We feel justly warranted in saying that the water works are in first-class condition, giving good service to consumers and paying the tax payers a just return for their investment.
