Obituary of J. T. Wingfield.

J. T. Wingfield was born Nov. 19, 1807, in Hanover county, Virginia. He was converted to God in his nineteenth year, and joined the M. E. church. While living in Clackamas county he, for convenience sake, joined the Presbyterian church. Then, when Rev. T. H. Organ organized a class of the Wesleyan Methodists at Oregon City, he joined that.

In his 28th year he was married and became the father of nine children—five girls and four boys—five of which, three girls and two boys, crossed the death river before him. Four children mourn the loss of their father.

In 1846 he emigrated to Oregon and settled in Clackamas county, where he resided until his death. He was 88 years, 1 month and 29 days old when he died. Besides the remaining children he has a great many friends who mourn his loss.
