## BARLOW NOTES

### Democratic Club Organized—Padding River Log Jam Blows Out.

LITERARY WILL ADJOURN FOR THE SEASONS.—Last Friday evening there was quite a good attendance at the literary meeting in Columbia hall and quite an interesting program was rendered, including some fine selections on the violin and banjo by Messrs. W. S. Tall and J. Floyd. It was suggested by a member that the society be adjourned to meet Friday evening February 28th, when a rousing good time will be had and then adjourn to resume work next fall. This suggestion was put in the form of a motion which was readily seconded and carried. Mrs. Cass U. Barlow was then appointed by President Marks to assist the executive committee in preparing an extensive program for that evening. A minstrel company of nine has already been formed and commenced rehearsals, so we may look for something very good from them. The program has not yet been completed but we feel assured it will be a good one.

A WELL-KNOWN MAN DIES.—Mr. Henry Koehler well known in this county and for a number of years in business in your city, but for the past three years proprietor of the Koehler House in this place, died at his home here Sunday evening at about 5:30 o'clock. Mr. Koehler was born in New York in 1824, and when but a young man migrated to Missouri with a colony in which he figured very prominently, after a dozen years of hard work in building up a manufacturing town, he disposed of his interests and came to the Pacific coast and made his residence in Oregon City some ten years ago. He was seventy-two years old at the time of his death, and had a large circle of friends which was evinced by the number who attended his funeral, and the profusion of flowers sent. Mr. O. W. Quint, our townsman, officiated at the grave with very appropriate remarks. Mr. Koehler leaves a wife to mourn his loss.

A BUSY DAY.—Last Saturday was the scene of a great many people from the country, some coming in for the purpose of attending the creamery meeting, others for the meeting of the Barlow grange, while a goodly number came to attend the democratic meeting for organization. The creamery meeting was called for the purpose of ways and means by which they could collect from delinquents. The Grangers met in their lodge rooms and conferred degrees on three new members besides other routine business: while the democrats assembled in the creamery hall and perfected the organization of a democratic club with the following officers: E. M. Brackett, president, and Alex. Baty, secretary. The roll was signed by about nine and arrangements will now soon be made to have speakers brought here to enthuse and add to the list of the charter members.

MAY BE A GREAT BENEFIT TO US.—Last Wednesday's train brought three Michigan capitalist lumbermen, who, soon after arriving, secured conveyances to be driven up the Molalla above Dickey's Prairie. Two popular lectures which were delivered before a workingman's club, one on "Armatures," by W. H. Freedman, and one by Prof. Francis B. Crocker on "Methods of Connecting Dynamos and Motors," form the last of the formal papers.

The Willamette Chautauqua circle of Portland sends a very cordial invitation to the Chautauquans and Chautauqua stockholders of Oregon City and vicinity to attend a grand rally of the circles of Portland at Dr. Locke's church on Wednesday evening, March 14. Dr. Locke will address the Chautauquans and the Willamette circle will present in costume the famous scenes from the Continental Congress July 1st to July 4th, 1776.
