The Farmers' Institute.

The prospects now bid fair that the farmers' institute to be held in this city on Friday and Saturday, February 28 and 29, will be one of the most interesting and profitable meetings ever held in the state. The local committee consisting of Capt. J. T. Apperson, Col. R. A. Miller, Supt. H. S. Gibson and Pres. E. E. Charman of the board of trade, are getting all the details arranged and will have everything so well looked after that there will be no further hitch in the proceedings. The sessions will be held in the circuit court room in the court house and will include morning, afternoon and evening session for both Friday and Saturday. The program is as yet not fully completed but so far as arranged is as follows:

Address of welcome by President E. E. Charman, of the board of trade, and response by Professor Shaw; "The Agricultural College and Its Work," by Professors Cordley and Shaw; a paper by Mrs. Dye; "The Future of Hops," by Jacob Risley; "The Hop Louse and How to Combat Him," by Professor A. B. Cordley; "Sheep as Weed Exterminators," by Richard Scott; "The Conservation of Energy," by C. F. Clarke; "Vegetable Nutrition," by Professor G. W. Shaw; a paper on poultry raising by Elmer Dixon; "Fruitgrowing in Western Oregon," by Hon. H. B. Miller; address by Col. R. A. Miller. Opportunity will be afforded for discussing each of the agricultural topics presented. The programme will be interspersed with music.
