

Call for Conventions.

A Republican convention for the State of Oregon is called to meet in the city of Portland, on Thursday, April 9, 1896, at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of nominating candidates for presidential election and state and district offices, except congressmen, and of electing four delegates at large to the Republican National Convention, and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention. The convention will consist of 237 delegates, chosen by the several counties as follows:

The same being one delegate at large from each county and one delegate for every 200 votes and for every fraction over one-half thereof cast for the republican candidate for governor at the election held in this state on June 4, 1894.

The committee recommends that the primaries be held on Saturday, March 21, and the county conventions on Saturday, March 28, 1896, unless otherwise ordered by the proper county committees.

All voters in favor of the republican principle of protection to American industries and American labor, the upbuilding of a home market, a sound financial policy and a patriotic enforcement of the Monroe doctrine are cordially invited to unite with us.

DISTRICT CONVENTION.

REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

Notice is hereby given to all voters who believe in the policy of the Republican party, and who believe that the industrial system of this county should not be destroyed, and who believe that the affairs of the county, state and nation should be administered upon safe, sound, conservative and economical principles, and who believe that the interests of the tax-payer should be zealously guarded by those placed in power by the people, and that every public servant should render a direct account to the people for his official acts, and to those who believe that the financial system of this government should be so managed and conducted as to meet with the approval of honest and conservative men of all classes, and to meet the requirements of the business and laboring world, and to those who intend to vote for a change from Democratic policies to Republican policies, and to those who intend to support the ticket nominated by the Republican convention this year, and they are invited to participate in the Republican primaries, to be held at the usual voting places in the different precincts except in Milk Creek precinct, where the voting place is changed to Grange hall near Howard's, Clackamas Co., State of Oregon, which are called for Saturday, March 21st, 1896, for the purpose of choosing delegates from their respective precincts to attend the Republican County Convention, which is hereby called to meet in Oregon City, on Wednesday, March 25th, 1896. That said convention is for the purpose of nominating candidates for the following offices: Three representatives, county commissioner, county clerk, county recorder, sheriff, county treasurer, county assessor, county school superintendent, county surveyor and county coroner, and for the nomination of justices of the peace and constables for the several justice districts of the county; and for the further purpose of electing 12 delegates to represent Clackamas county in the Republican State Convention to be held in Portland, on the 9th day of April, 1896, and 12 delegates to attend the Republican congressional convention of the first congressional district to be held in Albany, April 7th, 1896.

The convention will consist of 133 delegates apportioned to the different pre-

dicts as shown below, and being based on one delegate at large for each precinct, and one delegate for every 30 votes or fraction of thirty votes cast for Hon. Binger Hermann, in the said precincts at the election held June 4, 1894.
