CLACKAMAS COUNTY MINES.—There is every evidence of very rich gold deposits in the southeastern part of Clackamas county. James Thorne, of this city, has leased the gold-bearing quartz ledge on Ogle creek, belonging to John N. Stewart, Henry Russell and Charles Pelkey, for a term of five years. Mr. Stewart is a prominent farmer, residing near Molalla corners, while Messrs. Russell and Pelkey live on the upper Molalla. Mr. Thorne has a number of gold-bearing rock specimens from this ledge that are very rich, large deposits of gold being plainly visible to the naked eye. It is not yet known how extensive this ledge is, but there is an immense lot of pay ore in sight. A cut has been made into the side of the ledge 12 feet wide and 14 feet deep, and thus far the pay rock is abundant. If the pay streak holds out, when the snow melts and spring opens hundreds of people will flock to this new mining camp, as there are several other ledges in this vicinity and a number of placer claims were located there last summer, all of which possess every indication of becoming paying properties. The rock formation of this ledge is different from anything heretofore discovered in Oregon. Instead of the usual white and red quartz formation, a portion of the gold-bearing rock is porphyry and the remainder from the same ledge has the appearance of being decayed, discolored quartz. As soon as the snow disappears Mr. Thorne will erect one of his improved gold-saving quartz mills on the property, and he will operate and receive half of the proceeds of the mine for a term of five years. Gold was discovered on Ogle creek about forty years ago, and but little attention was paid to it at the time. No more prospecting was done in that section until about two years ago. On the Henry creek side of the mountain where the ledge is located, Mr. Thorne has prospected the dirt all the way down the side of the mountain, and found gold in paying quantities, indicating that the deposits must have come from this gold-bearing quartz ledge. Ogle creek is a small tributary of the upper Molalla, and is about forty miles from Oregon City. There is a good wagon road to Elk Prairie, a distance of 26 miles, leaving about 14 miles of comparatively easy country over which to come to a wagon road. Oregon City is a good distance from these mines, as the route from this city is more convenient than the proposed road from Stewart's Mills. It is one of the possibilities that that section may prove to be another Crispus creek.

DEMAND FOR OREGON HARDWOOD.—A review of the demand for the hardwood lumber of this state appears to have taken place. Of the activity of the lumber and millmen along the coast. operations down the river and stream for a dozen miles above the mill. The lumber is loaded on rafts and small. Besides other large rafts, have recently passed down the river. The concern, the steamer Hoag, was yesterday morning, having a large raft of lumber and being loaded with Oregon pulp mill at Oregon City. The raft contained 125,000 feet of lumber, will be required in making the raft. The arrival at Corvallis of special rafts, above is of almost daily occurrence. Rafts of from ten to fifteen thousand feet having been received at the mill on Thursday afternoon. Both were composed of oak and maple logs, the logs factored into hardwood lumber, supplying of 250,000 feet of wood. Corvallis Lumber company has contracted with parties who are shipping San Francisco. In fact the demand for Oregon hardwood is so extensive in San Francisco that Forsythe the Newberg sawmill man is buying much of the hardwood that can be turned at the Willamette. The firm of a 25,000-foot shipment of oak and maple turned out by the Corvallis Lumber mill, left down the river by the O. & N. steamer yesterday morning and goes to San Francisco and was put there by the Newberg man.

CAME OUT VICTORIOUS.—The Washington, is noted for the absence of feeling of hostility existing between the different political factions. It will leave no stones unturned by one or other out of office. J. E. Hedges, former Oregon City boy, who is now county treasurer of Pierce county, Washington, was recently arrested on charge of collecting interest on public money. The prosecution was instigated by three members of the chamber of commerce, who had an understanding with the board of county commissioners that as soon as a conviction on the charge against Hedges could be secured one of their own clique was to be installed in the county treasurer's office, which was to be decided by a former city treasurer of Tacoma, who belonged to the Hedges crowd had been recently deposed on the same charge, and another man put in his place. But Hedges was not to be bluff so easily, he secured the services of Cushman & Cushman, a prominent law firm, and won his case in the superior court and in all probability will hold down the office of county treasurer until his term expires. Attorney J. E. Hedges and W. A. Hedges, of Canemah, have been in Tacoma for several days attending the trial on the trumped up charge. The many Clackamas county friends of J. E. Hedges will be pleased to learn that he has come out on top.

FIREMEN'S BALL AT WEINARD'S HALL.—The firemen's ball at Weinard's hall last Friday night proved a grand success in every way. The event had long been anticipated by the firemen and their friends and the new-paper announcements and the picturesque streamers painted by J. C. Rhodes, had awakened a feeling of anxious expectancy among the dance-loving public. It was the first public gathering held in the elegant new hall, and all present made the best of the occasion. There was a nice crowd, and they enjoyed themselves. Just as they sat down to supper the fire bell rang out an alarm, and about six members of the Fountain Hose Company rushed down the street with their cart and ran over a dry goods box, which had been carelessly left in the street in front of a store, and several of them severely skinned their lower limbs, among them Postmaster Green. When they reached the scene of the fire at the old Phoenix House, the Cataracts had put out the incipient blaze. The committee who so successfully managed the ball were Walter Little, Will Rhodes, George Wiehart, Frank Rogers and S. R. Green, but the firemen do not appreciate the fact of dry goods boxes being left on the streets over night, especially when they are hurriedly summoned to attend a fire.
