Y. P. S. C. E. RALLY.—A grand rally of the Christian Endeavor societies of Oregon City was held at the Congregational church Tuesday evening. G. H. Bestow, president of the local union, presided. Stirring addresses were made by Fred Lockley, of Salem, treasurer of the State Endeavor society; Rev. A. J. Montgomery, pastor of the Oregon City Presbyterian church, and Rev. G. E. Hawes, pastor of the United Presbyterian church of Portland. Mr. Lockley gave some interesting statistics, showing the wonderful growth of the Christian Endeavor movement in this country, its membership now numbering over two and a half million. The first state endeavor convention ever held in Oregon met at Oregon City on June 13th, 1889, and consisted of 40 delegates. Rev. Warren Landon, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, of Portland, was made president at this first state convention, and Mrs. H. A. Newall, of Salem, was made secretary. As an indication of the wonderful growth of the Endeavor movement in Oregon, the convention which convenes at the Congregational church in this city on April 14th, will have in attendance about 500 delegates, and every section of the state will be represented. Rev. Montgomery did not want the state convention to come here as an incentive to a real estate boom, but that we desired to have this great gathering for the good that would accrue to Oregon City in a moral way. If any of the visitors to the convention, however, decided to make this their home, and engage in business here, they would be welcomed. Rev. Hawes made an urgent appeal for prayerful and earnest work at the coming convention. Much interest and enthusiasm was manifested at this gathering, and active and interested work is being done by the local committees in preparation for the seventh annual convention of the Oregon Endeavor Society.

OREGON PIONEER ASSOCIATION.—The annual meeting of the Oregon Pioneer Association will be held at Portland on June 16th this year. The regular date is the 15th, but according to the association's constitution, June 15th was made pioneer day because the treaty of 1846 was then signed, but as that date falls on Monday the reunion is to be held on the following day. This accounts for the change in the date. Hon. George H. Williams, a pioneer of 1853, of Portland, will deliver the annual address, and Hon. T. W. Davenport, 1851, of Salem, the occasional address. Rev. J. S. Griffin, 1839, will be grand chaplain, and William Kapus, 1853, grand marshal, he selecting as his aides George H. Durham, B. B. Beckman, F. P. Mays, E. A. King and Lansing Stout.

SENT TO THE ASYLUM.—Rev. James C. Read, of this city, is again an inmate of the state insane asylum. He was examined before County Judge Hayes last Friday, on complaint of W. C. Johnson, and pronounced insane. The petition filed with the county judge alleged that his mother, sister and a brother had

been insane, and that Mr. Read had suffered from typhoid and malarial fevers. He had also been struck on the head by a grubbing hoe, which had evidently affected his mind. He was committed to the state insane asylum on 18th day of last April, after the trial for his attempted robbery of the East Portland bank, and was discharged several months afterward as cured. He returned to Oregon City, and after remaining with his family for a few weeks, went to California with the expectation of making a new start and engaging in some line of business. Not succeeding, he recently returned home and appeared to be very much dejected. His condition has been such as to cause grave apprehension in the minds of his family and friends, and he had been carefully watched for several days. Mr. Read was taken to the asylum Friday evening by Sheriff Maddock.

TOM CLARK IN CUSTODY AGAIN.—Sheriff Maddock returned from Tacoma Wednesday night, having in custody the notorious Tom Clark, who escaped from Clackamas county jail on the evening of December 31st, in company with Walter Wyland, who was awaiting a hearing on a charge of horse stealing; William Osterlee, bound over on a charge of rape, and Will Moore, the suit-club man, who had served a little over half of a three months sentence. Tom Clark was bound over to appear before the grand jury on a charge of robbing the Red Front store. His pal, Con Kelliher, was sent to the penitentiary from Multnomah county, after making his escape from the county jail, and was recaptured at Scappoose. The recapture of Clark is an important one, as he belongs to a noted gang of burglars who have been operating in the northwest for several months, and who had successfully looted stores in Oregon City, Vancouver and other places. In his efforts to apprehend Clark, Sheriff Maddock had offered a reward of \$20 for his capture, and this notice accompanied by a printed photograph of Clark, was sent to various sections of the country. Clark had been at Tacoma for about two weeks, and was arrested once by the police, who concluded that he was not the man wanted and discharged him from custody. He, however, still remained in Tacoma and was nabbed by the detectives, who had become convinced that he was the right man. Sheriff Maddock was notified by telegraph and hurried to Tacoma as soon as he could secure a requisition from the governor. Clark is very reticent as to his meanderings, since he left Oregon City, and nothing has been heard from the other prisoners, who escaped at the same time.

TAXABLE PROPERTY BY PRECINCTS.—Following is the amount of taxable property for each precinct in Clackamas county, as compiled from the assessment roll of 1895 by Assessor Bradley.
