Convention was called to order at 10 o'clock by Henry Meldrum, chairman of the county committee. S. M. Ramsby was made temporary secretary. For tellers the chair appointed J. U. Campbell, J. M. Tracy, H. A. Vorpal and Geo. Rinearson.

For permanent chairman Charles Holman of Upper Molalla and C. F. Clark of Clackamas, were placed in nomination. A ballot being taken Holman received 62 votes and Clarke 71. Clarke being declared elected came forward and on taking the chair thanked the delegation for the honor conferred on him, and pledged that he should discharge the duties of the office in a fair and impartial manner, and do his full part to make the session of the convention harmonious, that it put out a ticket that all republicans can support and give a rousing majority in June.

Rinearson then made a motion that a committee of three be appointed by the chair on credentials. As such committee Geo. O. Rinearson, J. M. Tracy and John Wolfe were appointed.

## BARLOW NEWS.

**Republican Primaries—Important Law Case—Other Doings.**

**AN IMPORTANT CIVIL CASE.**—Monday was the scene of a large gathering in town coming from every point of the compass to listen to the civil action brought by William Miller vs. Murray and McConnell. The attorneys for the prosecution were Messrs. Dye and Hurst, and for the defense were Campbell and Marks. The case was handled very creditably by both prosecution and defense. The point at issue was a suit brought to recover money from Murray on a verbal contract purporting to be as follows: Mr. Miller, the prosecutor in this action, originally held a promissory note and chattel mortgage on the hop crop of one Wing Ching (Chinaman) and it appears that the Chinaman in order to obtain picking money secured the same from Murray by agreeing to consign his hops through him, thereafter it was discovered by Mr. Murray that this mortgage was in existence, hence went to Mr. Miller and agreed verbally to assume the amount of this indebtedness against Wing Ching with a proviso that the chattel mortgage be cancelled. So in the evidence brought out Monday, Mr. Murray does not deny other than stating that in making this proposition, that he made the proviso that not less than seven cents should be received for the hops which amount, however, was not realized; hence the action. Several citations of the law were referred to, where-in supreme judges had decided that nothing would be in evidence unless an endorsement was made by writing on the instrument. The jury was out nine hours and brought in a verdict allowing the prosecution \$41 and costs.

**REPUBLICAN PRIMARY.**—More than usual interest was taken in the primary held in Columbia hall last Saturday, as was demonstrated by the great number of republican votes. From all appearances there seemed to be quite a number aspiring to be delegates to the county convention, as nine names were proposed, three of which could only be elected. The result was an election of Messrs. Andy Kocher, C. F. Ziegler, and C. U. Barlow. The delegates go to the convention unpledged, but to do the best they can in assisting in putting up a good strong ticket. Everything was harmonious and notwithstanding a few were disappointed, all were well satisfied.
