Y. M. C. A. ROOMS.—The Carpenters,
painters and paperhangers have been
very busy fitting up the Y. M. C. A.
rooms at the corner of Main and Eighth
streets. The entire interior of the build-
ing is being overhauled, repainted and
papered. The front portion of the lower
floor has been divided into two rooms,
one 16x16 for a reading room, and the
other 16x16 for an office. At the rear of
these rooms a gymnasium will be fitted
up, 20x34 feet in size. At the rear of
the gymnasium is a committee room,
and the bath will occupy another place
in the back part of the building. The
interior will present a neat and attract-
ive appearance throughout when the
work of renovation is completed. Levi
Johnson, the general secretary, is on
hand and is making active preparations
for the work of the association soon to
begin. Mr. Johnson will remove his
family to this city from East Portland,
during the latter part of the week. He
will occupy the Haley house on Four-
teenth street. It is interesting to note
the complete transformation of the Wy-
gant building, and to realize that it will
be used for the purpose of instructing
and elevating humanity. It is intended
to have a formal opening of the rooms
one week from next Sunday.

AN INSURGENT LEADER.—A few
years ago Capt. A. Evans, Jr., was a
prominent resident of Clackamas county.
Says an exchange he was imported from
the East by the managers and owners
of the Oswego Iron Works, and was
made superintendent of the immense
manufacture. He had the reputation of

being one of the finest blast furnace
builders in the country, and after some
parleying they secured his services at
a salary of \$1,000 a year. As he was a
high-priced man, they built a high-
priced house for his occupancy. He cut
a wide swath and spent much of his
time in Portland, where champagne
flowed freely, and was not slow to dis-
play the fact that he was prominently
connected with the Oswego Iron Works.
Debts began to accumulate against him
in Portland, and finally the company
discovered that he was not worth \$4,000
per year to them, so let him out. He
left his wife in Portland, and disap-
peared from view and an occasional in-
quiry failed to elicit any information as
to his whereabouts. The latest reports
give out the information that he is located
in Cuba, and that he is looked upon as
a leader of the insurgents in certain sec-
tions.

Y. P. S. C. E. RALLY.—A rousing
rally of the local Christian Endeavor
union was held at the Presbyterian
church. G. H. Bestow, president of
the Union presided, and the large audi-
torium was pretty well filled with an in-
terested audience. After a song service,
and a selection by a ladies' quartette,
consisting of Mrs. A. S. Dresser, Mrs.
Jennie White, Mrs. D. E. Sheppard and
Mrs. J. W. Gray, Rev. M. L. Ruge
read an appropriate selection from the
first chapter of John. After the invocation
by Rev. S. W. Stryker, Rev. W. J.
Arnold, pastor of the Third Presby-
terian church of Portland, was introduced
and made a most interesting and prac-
tical address on the preparation for
and the work of the coming conven-
tion. He said that the object of the con-
vention was not simply for the purpose
of entertaining the visiting delegates by
showing them through the electric
works and paper mills, but that they
should return to their homes thoroughly
imbued with the spirit of the convention.
Rev. C. H. Curtis, pastor of the Has-
salo street Congregational church, Port-
land, was the next speaker. Mr. Cur-
tis is ex-president of the State Endeavor
Society, and one of the most active
workers in the cause in the state. His
address was inspired with enthusiastic
utterances, and he paid a merited trib-
ute to Dr. J. W. Cowan, the father of
the junior endeavor movement. This
was the most enthusiastic meeting yet
held by the endeavorers, and the various
committees inspired to greater zeal are
active in the work of preparation for the
great convention. W. G. Beattie, chair-
man of the entertainment committee,
has already received a list of 200 dele-
gates, who will be in attendance. Sa-
lem and other towns have taken a spe-
cial interest in entertaining these con-
ventions, and Oregon City should sustain
her reputation as a convention city.

A GRAND OPENING.—Throngs of ladies
visited Miss Celia Goldsmith's grand
opening of her millinery emporium last
Saturday. The display in the show win-
dows, shelves and show cases attracted
widespread admiration. The stock was
specially selected by Miss Goldsmith on

was a gem and a novelty in its line.
There were roses that required minute
observation to distinguish from the full-
blossomed reality, and the entire room
was a veritable boudoir of beauty.

decorations by her sister, Miss Bertha,
and many were the compliments paid
to the artistic appearance of the new
store. Miss Goldsmith has had several

AN EGG MUSEUM IN GREAT VARIETY.
—That magnificent display of eggs in
Charman & Co's show window, belongs
to the collection of Edson Cheney, of
the Cheney art gallery. The collection
consists of over 150 varieties, some of
them rare specimens, and is a valu-
able acquisition both from a monetary
and ornithological standpoint. Among
this great variety of curiosities is an al-
ligator egg, small in size, but produc-
tive of a dreaded monster; ostrich eggs
of immense size ornamented with hand-
painting; rare bird egg from the Orient,
of all colors and shapes, and an assort-
ment of native eggs that would make
glad the soul of the relic hunter. This
display has attracted much attention,
and been universally admired by the
crowds that pass up and down Main
street.

A MILE OF CRESCENTS.

Sixty-seven Truck Loads of Them in Pro-
cession Down Broadway.

NEW YORK, March 29.—Sixty-seven
double trucks, bearing 3,622 Crescent
bicycles, paraded this afternoon from
the freight depot at Sixtieth street and
North river through Fifty-ninth to
Eleventh avenue, to Fifty-seventh to
Eighth avenue, to Forty-second, and
down Broadway to the Western Wheel
Works eastern headquarters on Warren
street. Each truck bore on either side a
4x3 foot banner with the Crescent sky-
high emblem and various original catch
line phrases. A REFEREE man counted
thirty-six of them as he rode on a Broad-
way car from Chambers to Grand street,
so that it is safe to say that the proces-
sion was fully a mile in length. People
stopped to gaze in wonder and passen-
ders in the cars stood up and gaped with
astonishment at the sight of the greatest
shipment of bicycles ever made. It took
a special train of fifteen large furniture
cars to transport them to this city and
fully 150 men to load them on the trucks,
which task consumed six hours and
twenty-five minutes. They arrived at
the Warren street warehouse at 4:10 p.
m. and were stored at 9:40 o'clock.
This line of wheels is now on exhibi-
tion at Huntley's book store.
