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

### THE STATE CONVENTION.

**Republicans Meet—Adopt a Strong Platform—Great Enthusiasm Displayed.**

The Republican State convention which met in Portland last Thursday did not finish its labors until Friday evening. Thursday was spent in trying to effect an organization, something hard to do with two rival delegations from Multnomah county each claiming recognition. On a temporary organization being effected and after much discussion as to seating of the Multnomah delegates it was left to a vote of delegates from the other counties and it was decided to seat half of each faction and thus compromise the matter. Hon. Geo. H. Williams was made chairman and to his wise counsels and impartial rulings was due the harmony that prevailed during the session of the convention.

Friday the convention settled down to business. For delegates to republican national convention at St. Louis, Judge J. W. Melirum of Clackamas county, ex-Senator Charles Hilton of Wasco county, R. A. Booth of Josephine and Charles H. Dodd of Multnomah were chosen. They were instructed to vote for McKinley. The alternates chosen were: Geo. A. Steel of Multnomah, M. C. Harrison of Multnomah, J. M. Vandyne of Polk, Max Pracht of Jackson and the following gentlemen were chosen for presidential electors: T. T. Geer of Marion county, S. M. Yoran of Lane county, E. L. Smith of Wasco county, John F. Caples of Multnomah county.

The present chief justice, R. S. Bean, was nominated for the supreme judgeship by acclamation.

For district attorney for this district T. J. Cleeton was nominated, the ballot of the joint delegation of this district standing 19 for Cleeton to 16 for W. S. Barrett of Washington county.

Sol Hirsch was made chairman of the state central committee. Chas. Holman was made committeeman for this county. The delegates from Clackamas county were as follows:

J. F. Broetje, Thad S. Stipp, by Chas. Holman, proxy, C. H. Holstrom, Jas. Simpson, by H. S. Gibson, proxy, Geo. Broughton, E. E. Charman, L. L. Porter, J. K. Graham, by Geo. C. Brownell, proxy, C. U. Barlow, A. J. Yoder, by C. H. Dye, proxy, O. H. Wright and C. G. Huntley.

The committee on platform made two reports, Sol Hirsch presenting the majority report, which is practically the Ohio platform on finance, while Claud Gatch presented a minority report favoring a gold standard unequivocally. The minority report of Mr. Gatch was rejected by a vote of 108 to 129 and the majority report was then adopted. The following is the platform as adopted:

**THE PLATFORM.**  
The representatives of the republicans of the state of Oregon, in convention assembled, call attention to the condition of industry and business throughout the country as a proof of the necessity of the policy of the republican party, under which there was general prosperity during their thirty years.

We re-affirm the principles of the republican national platform of 1892, and assert that the results that have followed the change decreed by the election of that year have justified our protest against the national policy adopted by the democratic party.

**Protection.**—We believe that the government should have ample revenue, with a sufficient surplus over ordinary expenditures to provide for the coast defenses, for the steady building up of the navy, and for the constant reduction of the public debt. We believe that the present tariff, with its lowered rates and its destructive and dishonest system of undervaluations, and discrimination as to localities, should be replaced by one framed on protective principles, similar to that of the McKinley bill and arranged to give ample protection to American industry, and to restore the reciprocity policy of James G. Blaine.

We have always given protection to shipbuilders. In late years we have neglected to protect our shipowners. We believe the time has come to return to the policy of Washington and Hamilton, which, by discriminating duties in favor of American bottoms, secured 90 per cent of our carrying trade to American ships, and which, if now restored, would again revive our shipping and cause American freights to be shipped to Americans.

**Finance.**—The American people, from tradition and interest, favor bimetallism, and the republican party demands the use of both gold and silver as standard money with such restrictions and under such provisions, to be determined by legislation, as will secure the maintenance of the parity of values of the two metals so that the purchasing and debt-paying power of the dollar, whether of silver, gold or paper, shall be at all times equal. The interests of the producers of the country, its farmers and workingmen demand that every dollar,

paper or coin, issued by the government shall be as good as any other dollar.

**Election of Senators.**—Resolved, that we earnestly endorse the proposed amendment to the constitution of the United States providing for the election of United States Senators by popular vote, recently reported from the committee on privilege and elections by Senator Mitchell, and now pending consideration in the United States senate.

**Cascade Reserve.**—Resolved, That the application of the Oregon delegation in congress to the president of the United States and now pending before him, praying a modification of his proclamation creating the Cascade Forest Reserve, is hereby earnestly approved, and we appeal to the president to grant the prayer of our delegation in congress.

**Fishing.**—We realize the importance and magnitude of the fishing industry on the Columbia river, and would recommend that some provisions be made for a state hatchery for artificial propagation and that the laws regulating the close season be rigidly enforced.

**Rebate to Settlers.**—That we endorse the efforts of our representatives in congress to secure re-payment to settlers of Oregon of the excess of \$1.25 per acre wrongfully collected by the government on land located in the limits of the unearned Northern Pacific railroad land grant now forfeited.

**Canal.**—The construction of the Nicaragua canal is of the highest importance to the American people, both as a measure of national defense and to build up and maintain American commerce. It is moreover of special importance to our Pacific states, and we demand its completion as speedily as possible by the government of the United States.

**Pensions.**—We hereby endorse the action of our senators and representatives in congress in their endeavor to secure grants of pensions to Indian war veterans.

**Retrenchment.**—We pledge the republican party to rigid economy in the expenditure of public money, to the reduction of excessive salaries, and the abolition of the tea system wherever possible, and of all useless commissions; and believe that no appropriation should be made to any school or charitable institution not under control of the state; and oppose the incorporation into the general appropriation bill of items for the expenditure of public money not authorized by law.

**Immigration.**—We demand enactment of rigid restrictions on foreign immigration both for protection of our country against illiterate and vicious classes from foreign countries and for protection of our labor and preservation to our own people of our national domain.

**International Improvements.**—We commend the policy of the republican party in relation to internal improvements, and, in particular, in opening our waterways to commerce, and we denounce the illiberality of the democratic party in these matters.

**Resolutions.**  
To the Worshipful Master, Wardens and Brethren of Multnomah Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M.  
Your committee appointed to draft suitable resolutions on the death of Brother Paquet, would respectfully submit the following:

Whereas, It has pleased the Grand Master of the Supreme Grand Lodge to call our beloved brother and past master, Peter Paquet, from labor to the light and refreshment which are the Mason's hope and reward, and  
Whereas, Brother Paquet was an active, intelligent, loyal member of Multnomah Lodge for 20 years, always faithful and efficient, whether serving as the youngest entered apprentice or as the master of the lodge, and  
Whereas, Our deceased brother was a man of unquestioned integrity, a true friend, a good citizen, whose official services were marked by firmness, intelligence and honesty, and a husband and father whose example to the world in filial affection is worthy of imitation, therefore be it

Resolved, That Multnomah Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M., in the untimely death of Brother Paquet, mourns the loss of a true and loyal member; our country and state, a useful citizen; and his family, a true and loving husband and father.

Resolved, That our heartfelt sympathy be extended to the family of our deceased brother in this hour of affliction and grief.

### COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS.

**Present, Gordon E. Hayes; Judge: R. Scott and F. Jaggard, Commissioners. April Term, 1896.**

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of S. J. Vaughan and J. R. Kinyon for a change in the Butteville and Graham ferry road, the same was laid over and expense account paid by petitioners.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of R. Staub, et al, for a road, was laid over until the May term.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of E. W. McIntyre, et al, for a county road, the same was ordered opened, and expense account of \$17.85 ordered paid.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of J. B. Culick, et al, for a county road, the report of the viewers was approved, and expense account of \$35.40 ordered paid.

In the matter of the report of viewers of damages on the Daniel Mayer road, it was ordered opened upon payment of \$150 damages by petitioners. Expense account of \$16.20 ordered paid.

In the matter of the report of damages on the C. C. Miller road, the same was ordered opened upon payment of damages amounting to \$50, and the expense account of \$12 ordered paid.

In the matter of the petition of Ivan Olsen, et al, for a county road, the same was referred to D. W. Kinnaird, road-master, to investigate and report upon advisability and practicability of said road.

In the matter of the petition of S. D. Coalman for rates of toll to be fixed on the Barlow & Mount Hood road, the court ordered as follows: Now at this time the above matter coming on regularly to be heard on petition duly presented by S. D. Coalman, vice-president of the Mount Hood & Barlow Wagon Road Company, and being fully considered by the court, it was therefore ordered and adjudged that the following rates of toll are hereby fixed and established as the tolls to be collected at their said toll gate on the said company's road in said county and state:

- Each four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one span or yoke of horses, mules or oxen, \$2.
- Each additional span of horses, mules or oxen attached to said vehicle, 40c.
- Each two or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse, \$1.25.
- Each saddle horse with rider, 75 cents.
- Each horse or mule with pack, 40c.
- Each horse or mule (loose), 15 cents.
- Each head of cattle (loose), 10 cents.
- Each head of sheep, goats or hogs, 02 cents.

It was ordered that a warrant of \$5 per month be allowed for the relief of Mrs. Hattie Woods, and that a warrant for \$5 be drawn for immediate necessities.

A petition was read from E. S. Bramhall, et al, for the Bull Run bridge to be rebuilt, which was laid over.

The petition of G. W. Prosser and others to have wages for road labor restored to their original rates as existed last year, was granted.

The claim of Mrs. M. F. Bogan for \$20,000 damages, by reason of an accident that occurred on the Canby and Barlow road last fall, was disallowed.

In the matter of the application of Mead Post, G. A. R. for an appropriation for the funeral and expenses of the last illness of John Higgins, deceased, it was ordered that the sum of \$45 be paid out of the soldier's indigent fund.
