Flag Raising. The two public schools at Logan joined their forces had a flag raising and appropriate exercises on Arbor day at each of the school houses. At the Lower Logan school the exercises were held in the forenoon and the scholars under the direction of their teacher, Miss Reed rendered a very pleasing and interesting program. An address was made by Prof. H. S. Strange on what the flag stood for and what patriotism was, touching on the obligations that was due from every person to their country. The address was well received and at its close the flag was unfurled from the flagpole and three cheers given, each for the flag and for Prof. Strange. The exercises at the Upper Logan school were held in the afternoon. A splendid program, commemorative of the pupils with the assistance of their teacher, Mr. Robert Ginter, and it was rendered in a splendid manner. The address was made by Prof. H. S. Strange in which he outlined the duties pertaining to American citizenship and both pleased and instructed his audience with the thoughts he expressed. The attendance at each school was very large embracing the school board, parents of the pupils and many persons from a distance and the day was made one of the events in the history of Logan.
