OSWEGO NEWS.

County Division Dead in the Iron Town—G. W. Prosser the Favorite.

OSWEGO, April 29.—Last week's Iron Worker contained an article in reference to G. W. Prosser, candidate for the legislature on the republican ticket, which does an injustice to Mr. Prosser, and should be refuted. The Iron Worker stated that Mr. Prosser, while a member of the state legislature in 1881, introduced a bill to cut off Oswego from Clackamas county, and to annex the same to Multnomah county, and that no doubt Mr. Prosser was still in favor of doing so, and would work to that end if elected, and that the Iron Worker, being in favor of the annexation scheme, would support Mr. Prosser. In regard to Mr. Prosser's action in 1881 the statement is true; but Mr. Prosser was not alone in his wishes at that time. There were numbers of good men in our end of the county at that time in favor of the bill, and I think rightly so. Let us look at the condition of affairs at that time: First—there was no county road from Oswego to Oregon City, except by way of A. R. Shipley's. Every one knows that it was a long way around, with a big hill both going and coming, and no bridge across the Willamette river. It is true there was a narrow trail running along the river, but we could scarcely travel it on horseback, let alone with a wagon. Oswego was just about as completely isolated as far as the county seat was concerned, as though it had been located way out in the foot hills. On the other hand Oswego was connected with Portland by a good road, with a daily stage to and from Portland. No trouble whatever to get to Portland and return the same day. Under the conditions then existing it would have been better for Oswego to have been in Multnomah county. But those conditions are different now. While we have a good road to Portland we also have a good road to Oregon City, no hills to climb going or coming, and the distance only about one half what it was around the old road. In addition to the road we have a free bridge across the river, both built by reason of this agitation, and when built the cry for division ceased. No one in Oswego now, so far as I know, wants to be placed in Multnomah county, unless it is the editor of the Iron Worker, and if the question was submitted to vote annexation would receive only one ballot,—that of the aforesaid editor. There is one thing quite sure, and the people of Clackamas county ought to know it: it is that G. W. Prosser is not in favor of any division of the county, and will work against it should it be brought forward as a bill as any man in the county.

I believe the voters of Clackamas county will show their good judgment on the first Monday in June by electing Mr. Prosser by a good big majority.

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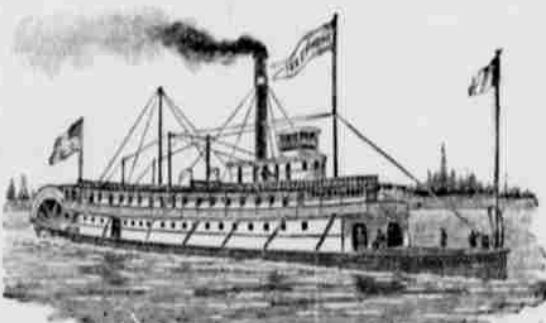
