THE TEACHERS MEET.

The regular monthly meeting of the Clackamas County Teachers Association was held in the school house at Milwaukie, Saturday May 23d, 1896. Called to order by the president, Supt. Gibson.

The minutes of the previous meeting as prepared by the secretary, Miss Fannie G. Porter, were read and approved. The meeting began with singing "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" with Miss Mullan as organist. It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Association at Union hall, the last Saturday in June. Miss Jennie E. Rowen, Mr. C. Rutherford and Mr. E. M. Ward were asked to prepare a suitable program for that occasion.

"How Much Arithmetic" was assigned to S. W. Holmes who was absent. H. S. Gibson opened the discussion. He was followed by A. C. Strange, P. M. Weddell, T. J. Gary, Mr. Alderson and Mrs. Annie Wells. The subject was thoroughly discussed. All emphasized the need of practical problems and practical work. A great deal depends on starting right. Miss Fannie G. Porter read an able paper on "Child Study." Miss Porter believes that it is the teacher's duty to so train the pupil that upon leaving school he may be equipped morally, intellectually and physically for his future duties as a loyal, patriotic and intelligent citizen of this glorious republic of ours. Remember you are teaching children. Paul Kiel recited "William Tell" in first rate style. "Nature Study," was introduced by E. M. Ward. If a pupil leaves school without having been thoroughly aroused to the wonderful and beautiful works which God hath wrought in nature, there is something lacking in his education. Elementary studies in botany are very useful in stimulating the observation of pupils. He was followed by Mr. Weddell, Mrs. Wells and Mr. Gibson. Mr. Gary announced the preparation of dinner as a problem for the teachers to solve. In the course of an hour each had solved the problem to his entire satisfaction. Beautiful ransies decorated the table. The people of Milwaukie refused to accept payment for the dinner, but as the school has a literary association, Mr. Gibson received collections and handed \$7.05 to the literary association.

Association called to order by Supt. Gibson. Program was opened by singing "Rally Round the Flag." Mrs. Wells read a carefully prepared paper on "Vertical Writing." The subject was discussed by H. S. Gibson, C. W. Durrett, H. S. Strange, T. J. Gary and George L. Story. The audience then listened to a beautiful song by four young ladies of Milwaukie. "Herbert and Herbartianism" was handled in an excellent manner by A. C. Strange. He gave a biographical sketch of Herbert, and designated him as the interpreting of Pestalozzi. In his teaching he followed the laws of psychological development. We cannot impart knowledge we can only stimulate the activity of the child's mind. Miss Eva Scott delighted the association by her manner of reciting "Picnic Sam." Little Miss Sarah Blegers sang "Peek-aboo" in a sweet, clear voice. Theodore Miller fairly brought down the house by his recitation of "Seeing Things at Night." H. S. Strange spoke on "Reforms Needed in our Teacher's Association." He was listened to with close attention, and referred to the attempt at the last State Teachers' Association, to re-organize

that body, which came to naught because unfortunately, more interest was around as to who would be made president, than as to the reforms which might be inaugurated.

It should be made impossible for teachers to be absent from state meetings under ordinary circumstances.

The Milwaukee quartet sang another lovely song.

The Association unanimously adopted resolutions, thanking the people of Milwaukie in general, and Mr. Gary and Miss Starkweather in particular, for the pleasant meeting, enjoyed by the teachers present.

There were about 40 teachers present and the large room was more than filled by the audience.

The Association sang "Blest be the Tie That Binds," after which the meeting was adjourned.

The program for the meeting at Union hall, the last Saturday in June, has not yet been received.

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
