CITY FATHERS ASSEMBLE.

An Uneventful Gathering, and but Little Business Done.

The regular monthly business meeting of the city council was held Wednesday evening. Mayor Straight was absent, and president of the council, L. L. Forter, presided.

The recorder's monthly report was read and approved. The matter of buying a new hose cart was referred to the committee on fire and water.

The bill of Jesse Cooke for \$113 rebate on Eleventh street improvement, was referred to the finance committee.

Ed Long was appointed poundmaster and city dog catcher. Sidney Smyth offered to furnish crushed rock for the improvement of Seventh street for \$1.50 per cubic yard, which on motion was referred to the committee on streets and public property.

The improvement of Seventh street, between Main and the railroad depot, was again brought up for discussion. Finally, after considerable talk, the matter was referred to the street committee, to get estimates on three kinds of improvement.

Probate Court.

Gordon E. Hayes, Judge. Henry J. Bottemiller was appointed administrator of the estate of Henry Bottemiller, deceased. The property left by the deceased is valued at \$100.

O. W. Sturges, administrator of the estate of Jacob Roop, deceased, filed his final account, which was approved.

There came up for hearing the commitment of Louise and George D. Carlton, minor children of Henry Carlton, to the custody of the Oregon Boys and Girls Aid Society. Sarah J. Clarke and Sarah J. Thomson, officers of the Clackamas W. C. T. U., and Emily Ruth appeared as witnesses. W. T. Gardner, superintendent of the Boys and Girls Aid Society, was also present. After taking the matter under proper consideration, the Judge legally awarded the children to the care and custody of the Oregon Boys and Girls Aid Society.

Charles E. West, administrator of the estate of Wladen C. Groff, deceased, filed his final report and account, and was discharged from further responsibility in the matter, and his bondsmen exonerated.

Obituary of Elton Coldren. Died, at his residence three miles east of Woodburn on May 29, '96, of Bright's disease, Elton Coldren, son of O. L. and Ann Coldren.

Elton Coldren was born in Leagrave county, Indiana May 17, 1863, in 1869 he emigrated with his parents to Bourbon county Kan. In the spring of 1879 he located with his parents near Silverton, Marion county; lived there for three years, removed to Elliott Prairie, Clackamas county and was there married to Jane J. Hinkle, Jan. 23, 1884, resided at said place up to last fall when he moved to Marion county and there resided up to the time of his death. Deceased leaves a wife and five children, father and mother, two brothers and one sister to mourn the loss of a dear relative. He was a loving husband, kind father and true friend respected by all who knew him.

Funeral services were held at the Congregational church at Hubbard, Rev. Dick officiating, after which the remains were taken in charge by Odd Fellows lodge No. 76, of which he was a member in good standing, and proceeded to Hubbard cemetery where the impressive ceremony of that order was rendered and the remains were laid in their last resting place.
