CHAUTAQUA NOTES

OREGON'S GREAT EDUCATIONAL GATHERING SOON TO TAKE PLACE.
People Coming From All Over the State—The Grounds to Be a Tented City—Young Ladies' and Young Gentlemen's Numbers.

Next Tuesday is the opening day of the Willamette Valley Chautauqua at Gladstone Park. All Oregon is turning its eyes in that direction. More campers have already selected sites than were ever known before. On the opening day Dr. Carlos Martyn of Chicago gives his famous lecture, "The Devil in Politics," and in the evening the Apollo Club of Portland, assisted by the conservatory singers of Salem renders the great oratorio, "The Creation," on the Chautauqua platform. Nothing equaling this in extent and magnificence has ever before been given in Oregon. The Portland singers gave "The Creation" at the Marquam Grand last April, it was considered the high water mark of musical effort in that city, but now Salem has given it with her singers and by arrangement the singers of the two cities met here at Gladstone to unite their voices in one vast festival of song. Rosa Bloch sings the soprano solos, Professor Boyer the tenors, and Paul Wessinger the bass solos. A picked and chosen orchestra accompanies the choruses. Professor Winkler of Salem, late of Leipzig presides at the organ. 200 trained singers take part in this world famed oratorio.

Some amusing inquiries come from campers for the Chautauqua. One woman wants to know if she can bring her pug dog. "Lone, lone females" want to know if somebody will help them put up their tents. Strangers want to know if there is any way to get to Gladstone Park from Oregon City. Some want to know if tents are furnished with the season tickets. From applications already in for tenting space it is made certain that Gladstone park will be a veritable city of tents. The management has endeavored to make this a feature of the assembly and is affording every convenience possible to the campers. Cold, clear Clackamas river water is supplied by pipes and hydrants to all parts of the grounds. The park is so large that the most perfect seclusion can be had by campers, yet be within easy reach of the auditorium. A more pleasant and healthful location for an outing could scarcely be found than in Gladstone park. Fuel is easily had and supplies can be purchased as cheaply as at any place in the state, for the markets of Oregon City and Portland are accessible as well as the stands upon the grounds which will keep all needed supplies. The restaurants on the grounds will give as good and as cheap a service as to be had in any town.

Parties of young ladies to camp with chaperones, are to come from Salem, Portland, Monmouth, Hillsboro and other places. A number of young men will also be present so that the social features of this great gathering will not be neglected. The special day programs will be the great attractions of the assembly and on these occasions some of the most noted talent of the United States will be on the platform. While the classes will excel, in the course of study, those of last year and now that our people are acquainted with their excellence and scope of work, they will be filled so soon as organized. Athletics will be one of the attractions at the assembly and the bicycle track has been enlarged and made into a regulation 4-lap track. The grade is perfectly level and was established by Engineer J. W. Hoffman, after he had made a thorough examination of all the tracks about Portland. The inside of the course will be leveled off for baseball, football and other games. The topography makes the grounds a natural amphitheatre so that all can see the games.

The car fare from Oregon City will be 2 1/2 cents, which is only given on 10-trip tickets to be purchased at the company's office at the Novelty Candy store. From Portland the fare will be 12 1/2 cents. A new and fast time card will be on during the assembly and all cars will stop at the grounds. The Southern Pacific Co. will not run a special train this year, but all their regular trains, including the overland will stop at the Chautauqua station during the session of the assembly. This company as well as the various other transportation lines in the state will give reduced rates to all attending the assembly.

The platform during the assembly will be in charge of Col. R. A. Miller, president of the association, who will see that the program is carried out with the promptness and freedom from hitches that characterized his work as the presiding officer for the assembly last year.

The general management of the grounds will be in the hands of H. E. Cross, who will see that the campers are properly located and that the police and other regulations are properly enforced. Mr. Cross has had the grounds put in perfect shape and he has had many improvements made since the assembly met last year. The perfect order and harmony that prevailed last year under his management will be sure to be duplicated this year. The ticket office will be in charge of H. C. Stevens and his son Harley. Mr. Stevens is one of the most expert ticket handlers and change makers in the state and he so successfully filled this difficult position at the former assembly that a jam at the gates never took place. The main gate will be in charge of D. H. Glass and J. A. Chase, while the gate at the S. P. railroad entrance will be in charge of F. H. Beach and son William. The marshals will be Max Schulpus, Millard Hatt and Jas. Lamar. The two first named were on duty last year and proved themselves to be the men for the place, and with Mr. Lamar, who is equally as good a man, the roughs and rowdies will have a sorry time of it when they come within the grounds. The night watchman will be Matt Huertth and there will be little danger under his efficient guardianship of the campers or any other persons belongings being molested. The janitor will be J. J. Burgess and it is safe to say that the grounds will be kept scrupulously clean while in his charge.
