In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of Ivan Olson, et al, for a county road, the same was granted.

In the matter of the report of viewers on the petition of J. C. Schmidt, et al, for a county road, the same was accepted and expense account ordered paid.

In the matter of the petition of Isaac Farr, et al, for a county road, the petition was refused.

In the matter of the report of viewers of damages on the change in the Canby and over-head bridge road, the same was accepted, and petition for a change in the road granted.

In the matter of the proposition of G. W. Church to furnish gravel for the Oregon City and Molalla road, the same was laid over.

In the matter of the petition of the Sisters of the Good Shepherd for relief from taxes, it was ordered that the five acres of ground upon which the building is situated, be exempt from taxation according to law.

In the matter of the application of William Borch and Ferdinand Secktem for an order refunding money paid as taxes, the clerk was instructed to notify them to appear at the next term, and prove that they were not owners of the property at the time of the assessment.

In the matter of Mrs. Jane Roberts, pauper, it is directed that the order heretofore made to give Mrs. Winsett \$20 for the care and keeping of Mrs. Roberts, be discontinued, and that a warrant be drawn in favor of William Davis for \$15 on the first day of each month for the care and keeping of said Mrs. Roberts.

In the matter of the bonds of the county treasurer, whereas it being known that the present bond of the treasurer is too small, and being fully advised that the present bond is not sufficient, it is therefore ordered that he procure the additional bond of \$20,000, making the total amount, \$50,000.

Our Consular Service.

"The consular service is the practical and business side of our foreign intercourse," writes ex-President Harrison in July Ladies' Home Journal. "There are more than twelve hundred persons in the consul of the United States."

There are located in the important commercial cities and towns of the world and are described generally as consuls general, consuls, commercial agents, interpreters, marshals and clerks. The duties of a consul are various and multifarious. He is the protector and guardian of American commerce; provides for destitute American soldiers and sends them home; he takes charge of the effects of American citizens dying in the jurisdiction, having no legal representative; he receives the declaration or protests of our citizens in any matter effecting their rights; he keeps a record of the arrival and departure of American ships and of their cargoes, and looks after vessels wrecked; he reports any new invention or improvement in manufacturing processes that he may observe, and all useful information relating to manufactures, population, scientific discoveries, or progress in the useful arts, and all events or facts that may affect the trade of the United States, and authenticates copies and statements of the market value of merchandise to be shipped to the United States. Every consulate is a commercial outpost; and if the service could be given permanence of tenure, and a corps of men of competent equipment, it would become a powerful agency in extending our commerce."

A PIONEER'S RECOLLECTIONS.

The First Newspaper in Oregon—Two Months a Year.

The following was written by D. J. Schnebly, in early days editor of the Oregon Spectator—Oregon's first newspaper—published in Oregon City. Mr. Schnebly, now advanced in years, publishes a weekly paper at Ellenburg, Wash.: The first newspaper established in Oregon was the Oregon Spectator in 1845. The place of publication was Oregon City. It was established by the missionaries of Oregon, which embraced all the territory from the British line, the 49th parallel, and was bounded on the east by the Rocky mountains and on the south by the California line. The paper was published five years and had in that time four or five editors. Hon. Robert Moore, of Linn City, purchased the plant with his good will in the fall of 1849. He secured the services of Rev. Wilson Blaine as editor for one year. At the close of Mr. Blaine's year the editor of this paper took charge of the Spectator for Mr. Moore for a year, at the close of which it was purchased by the editor.

In those days the news of the world was received twice a year; it was brought by way of the Horn in sailing vessels. There was no plagiarism, no copying of editorials without proper credit. The paper had to be made up wholly of local happenings and imaginings to the manor born.

In the winter of 1850 a semi-monthly mail was established between San Francisco and Portland. It was a great treat to get the mail every two weeks instead of twice a year, as formerly. To the editor it was an especial accommodation.

In the fall of 1850 the Western Star was established at Milwaukie, by the enterprising Lot Whitcomb. The paper was published there nearly a year, the work being done by John Waterman and W. D. Carter. Milwaukie was nearly the size of Portland, which contained about 300 inhabitants. Portland was a small place then, but being at the head of ship navigation it grew rapidly; and in the winter of 1850 the Oregonian was established by some enterprising citizens of the village—Stephen Coffin, John Crouch, Lowndale and others. T. J. Dyer was editor. Henry L. Pittock was not then a citizen of Oregon, but arrived in the early '50's and soon after became the devil of the office.

Thus the great paper of the Northwest had its early beginning. But it enjoyed the improved mail facilities almost if not quite, from its advent.

The Oregon Statesman was the next in the order of birth at Oregon City, and it was conducted by Asabel Bush for Samuel R. Thurston, the first delegate elected by Oregon to represent the territory at Washington. The paper was purchased by Thurston to aid in securing his re-election as a delegate. But unfortunately he died on his return, somewhere between the Isthmus of Panama and San Francisco. He was an indefatigable worker and did Oregon great service at Washington. He was the author of the donation law and had the new mail route established between Oregon and California, and had the first land office established at Oregon City.

The first census in Oregon was taken by Joe Meek, marshal of the territory of Oregon, whose deputy, Daniel O'Neill, did the most of the work. The deputy did good service for the Spectator during his ride over the country. We were indebted to our friend Dan for his Argus-eyed reports. The marshal had a large extent of country to ride over, and the country was sparsely settled in 1851.

In those early days the young men when they went sparking had to carry blankets with them. The proverbial "spare bed" was not often found in the residence of the dulcinea's home. The beau in going to and from his sweetheart's abode looked very much like a traveling man, but as it was the custom of the country it was little thought of, and the sweetheart had no difficulty in divining the visitor's thoughts.

Annual Teachers' Institute.

The annual institute for Clackamas county will be held at the Eastham school building, in Oregon City, beginning August 3rd at 1 o'clock p. m., and continuing for eight days. Nickels.

Our nickel coins are really misnamed, and should be styled copper coins. The 3 cent nickel contains 75 per cent of copper and only 25 per cent of nickel. The ordinary 5 cent nickel in common use has the same proportion of copper and nickel, three-fourths of the former and one-fourth of the latter.—St. Louis Globe Democrat.
