Last Monday a party of up-valley people, who were attending the Chautauqua assembly, left Hood river to ascend Mount Hood. Among the party were President P. L. Campbell, of the State Normal school, Miss Hibbard, Miss Millard Hibbard, Miss Ella Curran, of Salem, and Miss Anna Powell, of Albany.

CONTRACT LET FOR SCHOOL BUILDING.

At a special meeting of the board of directors of the Willamette Falls school district Tuesday evening the contract for erecting the new school building according to plans and specifications submitted was awarded Kinney & Reams of that place for \$1900, and the plumbing to Pope & Co. for \$248. The following bids were submitted: A. Cross, \$2169; A. D. Thorn, \$2393; R. H. Wall, \$3474; D. R. B. Winniford & Co., \$1703; T. S. Lawrence, \$1968; Kinney & Reams, \$1900; Jackson & Scott, \$2545.22. The following bids were received for painting: Kuertin Bros \$173; M. M. Olsen, \$270; T. S. Lawrence, \$200; G. H. Vore, \$230. The new building will be completed by October 15th and it will be the second best school building in Clackamas county, outside of the county seat.

RIVER NEWS.—Wednesday morning's Statesman gives the following concerning the movement of boats on the river: "The Albany came down from Corvallis last evening and the Hoag arrived here at the same time from Portland. These two boats will, hereafter, connect here, the former making round trips between this city and Corvallis, the latter plying between Salem and Portland.—The Gray Eagle went down the river yesterday morning, connecting with the Altona some distance below here. These two boats will make daily trips on the river, between Portland and Independence, meeting half way, where freight and passengers will be exchanged. The Rath went down to Portland yesterday morning and will come up tonight on her way to Corvallis. The Gypsy came down from Corvallis yesterday. She took on a cargo of flour at the Salem mills, and leaves for Portland this morning at 7:30 o'clock."

ACCIDENTAL DROWNING.—Another home was made sad in Oregon City by an accidental drowning last Friday evening. Gerald Haley Winsett, son of Mrs. C. P. Winsett, aged about six years, went to the river opposite his mother's residence about eight o'clock to go in bathing with his dog, which was his usual custom. As he did not return it was supposed that he had accompanied some other boys to the Chautauqua assembly at Gladstone park. When he did not return at a late hour, search was instituted and his clothes were found on the bank of the river. In the morning his body was found under some sawlogs in seven feet of water. He was a member of the Congregational Sunday school, and his funeral services were conducted at that church Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock by Dr. J. W. Cowan. The remains were interred in the city cemetery.

STEAMER TOLEDO HAULING GRAVEL.—The steamer Toledo on Tuesday, brought up the first scow load of gravel to be used on the streets of McMinnville. The gravel will be taken from here to McMinnville (7 miles) by team. Hereafter the Toledo, on her trips up the river will bring a barge load of gravel here, until the required amount contracted to be used on the streets of McMinnville this year, is brought up. It now appears that the streets of the capital of Yamhill county are to be made in good condition, and the city instead of being a mud hole will become a beautiful and pleasant city. We commend the enterprise and push of the citizens of our neighboring city, and hope it will become contagious throughout Yamhill county. Good roads and streets through the whole county is what is wanted. There is plenty of gravel to make them.—Dayton Herald.

ANOTHER Y. M. C. A. CONTEST.—Secretary Levi Johnson and the board of directors of the Oregon City Young Men's Christian Association are making arrangements for an interesting athletic contest. The contest will be between the battle-scarred "Reds" and "Yellows" and teams representing each color will meet on the athletic field to do themselves honor in a matched game of baseball and bicycle and foot races. The event will take place at Gladstone Park on the first day of August and the result will decide the championship between these teams. An admission fee of 10 cents will be charged which will form a nucleus of a building fund to provide the association with permanent headquarters. It is intended to make this series of athletics an annual event that will become prominent in the history of the association.

A LIVELY BLAZE.—Last Sunday about one o'clock in the afternoon the flames blazed up from the tall, dry grass in the enclosure between the sidewalk leading to the paper mills and the river near the west end of the suspension bridge. For awhile it looked as though the fire might do serious damage, but through the efforts of Chief-Engineer Green, C. A. Miller, E. E. Williams and others, the further spread of the flames was checked. After this was done, they brought over a hose cart and put out the remaining smoldering embers with water. Someone had evidently thrown the lighted stub of a cigar or cigarette into the dry grass, causing it to ignite and the flames traveled with lightning-like rapidity.

FOR THE STATE FAIR.—The executive committee of the Oregon State fair held a meeting at Salem last Saturday to arrange preliminaries for the State Fair to be held in October. President William Galloway, of Oregon City presided, and among other arrangements, Thursday, October 8th, was designated as pioneer day; October 12th will be Dairy day and Tuesday, October 13th Ladies' day. On the latter day there will be a mile horse race for ladies—bloomers not barred—for a purse of \$75. The following Oregon City people were elected to official positions on the grounds; Ticket vendors, railroad gate J. G. Pillsbury and H. C. Stevens; ticket taker, railroad gate, Max Schulpius; ticket seller, grand stand, Charles Galloway.
