To be Reconsidered.

She has blood in her eye. Some two or three months ago one G. Melvin Thorn, a young man living in Multnomah county commenced a suit for divorce, alleging that his wife, Alice M. Thorn had deserted him. He made affidavit that he could not find her in this state, and that he had searched diligently, and that he heard she was at Peppin, Wisconsin. On that showing Judge McBride, the suit was filed in the Washington county circuit court, made an order allowing the summons to be served by publication. Service was got in that way and at the July term of court a decree was entered on default of an answer. The proceedings of court were published in both the Independent and the Oregonian as a matter of news. It turns out that Mrs. Thorn was not in Wisconsin at all but in Portland. A friend showed her the paragraph announcing the divorce. That was the first she had heard of the proceedings. She is angry, declares that her husband knowingly committed perjury when he made the affidavit to get the order for publication of summons, for he had met her at meals every few days all spring and summer, and even last week when he started to Seattle he called to see her and the children. Mrs. Thorn's attorney Wm. Reed, was in Hillsboro last Monday taking the matter up that he may file a motion to open up the judgement. Mrs. Thorn says she never had but one quarrel with Melvin and that was because of one of his misdeeds that no wife ought to forgive. It is intimated that the door of the penitentiary stands ajar for the plaintiff in this suit.
