## THE TEACHERS MEET.

### Viola Entertains the Teachers Association—An Interesting Session.

The regular monthly meeting of the Clackamas County Teachers' Association was held in the church at Viola Saturday, August 1896, and was called to order by the president, Supt. H. G. Starkweather.

The minutes of the previous meeting, as prepared by the secretary, Miss Fannie G. Porter, were read and approved. The semi-annual election of officers resulted as follows: Vice-president, A. C. Strange; secretary, Fannie G. Porter; treasurer, L. T. Anderson; editor, Bertha M. Gibson.

No new names were added to the roll of the association.

"How much Psychology?" was the subject discussed by Miss Jennie Rowen. She spoke of some of the principles of the immortal Pestalozzi. Willard Austen spoke on "The Essentials of Good Citizenship." Every person who enjoys the protection of a government should endeavor to do all in his power to sustain and uphold the government. Laws are made to protect society and should be obeyed. "How to Secure the Co-operation of Parents" was the subject assigned Supt. Starkweather. Children have implicit confidence in their parents, and if the teacher and the school are adversely criticized, most of the work done by the teacher will be thrown away. The reputation of a teacher should be made in a school room. The subject was discussed by W. W. Austen and Robert Ginther.

On motion of Mrs. Kerten the meeting adjourned until 1:15 p. m.

The Ladies Aid Society prepared a delicious dinner for the teachers at a cost of only 15 cents each.

Afternoon session called to order by Supt. Starkweather. The unfinished subject of "Cooperation" was again discussed. Mr. Quinby, of Viola, spoke from the parents' point of view. A song by Robert Ginther was much enjoyed by the teachers. "Mistakes in Teaching" was taken by Charles Rutherford. Herbert Spencer says "education is complete living." In too many colleges the mind is developed at the expense of the body. What is the use of a splendid jewel in a shattered casket? If by a judicious question I can stimulate the mind of a pupil, so that he will search for a written truth, I think that is much better than telling him about it. "The best teacher is one who makes himself useless." Every time we do a right act, will and conscience win a victory; Every time we do a wrong act, will and conscience are weakened. Evil hurts the evil-doer most. Mrs. Kerten spoke on "Reading". Her paper was most interesting, and will be published later. Messrs. J. Hayden, Mattoon, Quinby and others spoke kind words of encouragement to the association. Miss Mollie Hankins, W. W. Austen and H. S. Gibson were asked to prepare a suitable program for the next meeting which will be held at Molalla the last Saturday in September.

## TELEGRAPH RATES REDUCED.

**The Reduction Applies to both Competing and Non-Competing Offices.**  
Beginning September first the Western Union Telegraph company put into effect new rates effecting all offices in Oregon, except those where the former rate was 25 cents for the first ten words and 2 cents for each additional word, and a few offices in Eastern Oregon and nearly all offices in Washington.

Below will be found a list of the principal offices effected by the change. It will also be seen by the list that the reduction will apply on both non-competing offices. The former rate of 50 cents in many instances, is reduced to 40 cents and the 40 cent rate to 25 cents. From the following named offices the old rate was 50 cents and the new rate is now 40.

Oregon—Ashland, Arlington, Central Point, Drain, Gold Hill, Grants Pass, Glendale, Heppner, Medford, Riddle, Siskiyou, Westport.

Washington—Anacortes, Everett, Kent, Lake View, Meeker, Monroe, North Yakima, Olympia, Puyallup, Roslyn, Seattle, Tacoma, Wallula, Yakima City. Astoria in Oregon, and Centralia and Chehalis in Washington, the old rate was 40 and 3 and the new one is 25 and 2. The Dalles, Hood River and Grants, formerly 50 and 3, now 25 and 2.
