Then the news flew round that the railway officials knew nothing about the special train, and after a brief delay it was apparent that the whole thing was a boax. The perpetrators of the hoax were never discovered, though two persons were afterward freely mentioned in connection with it. In the year of grace 1878 the era of practical jokes was past, but had the authors of the shah's visit been alive in the days of Theodore Hook they might have lived in literature.

#### Inhaling Carbonic Acid.

Professor Ugolino Mosso of Turin has tested the breathing of soldiers during an expedition up Monte Rosa, and found that the quantity of carbonic acid exhaled by a man at a height of 20,000 feet or so differs very slightly from what it is at the sea level or near it. The professor has also subjected himself to a rarefied atmosphere in the Physiological institution at Turin, and found that when the pressure in the air was still 34 centimeters (about 7 inches) of mercury, he felt no inconvenience, but when it was reduced to 30 centimeters (about 6 inches) he felt a great want of breath, and became unfit to make observations.-London Globe.
