They are now confident that if they do not make a satisfactory sale of the property to the New York parties, they can effect a sale to English capitalists. Their claims adjoin the Lucky Boy mine, which was recently purchased by English capitalists, and are equally as rich in every respect.

He was turned out and ordered to leave the city, which he did.

CLACKAMAS COUNTY DEMOCRATS.—This is a year of turbulent discussions and reorganization among political parties, and Clackamas county democrats are no exception to the rule. A meeting of the democratic county central committee was held last Friday afternoon, and it was very evident that a number of them could not endorse Bryan's populist ideas on "flat" money. Only nine members of the committee were present including Chairman J. E. Hedges, and Secretary A. W. Cheney.

THEY SURELY WILL.—A new illustration of killing the goose that lays the golden egg is furnished by the illegal capture of salmon below the rack placed in the Clackamas river, Oregon, to supply the United States government hatchery with eggs, says the Fishing Gazette. Superintendent Hubbard says that campers and others catch the salmon intended for use in the work of propagation as soon as their eggs and milt are mature. The rack is placed in the river before the fish begin to ascend to their spawning grounds, and without it the hatchery could not be stocked.

MORE ABOUT HOPS.—Hop growing is one of the important industries of Clackamas county as well as contiguous localities in the state. H. J. Miller, the well known hop buyer of Aurora, was in Oregon City Wednesday. He represents Frank D. Miller, of New York City, and they handle considerable of the output around Aurora, Butteville, Needy, Barlow and other sections.

ROUND OVER ON A CHARGE OF RAPE.—E. Thomas was arraigned before Justice Dungan at Molalla last Saturday on a charge of rape, preferred by Ruby Cannon, who resides near Willhoit Springs. The defendant is a married man, and resides near Silyerton, Marion county, with his family.

Every boat up the river is loaded with passengers bound for the hop yards, and for several days the roads have been fairly lined with wagons on the way to the hop districts, while many are traveling on foot.

Y. P. S. C. E. COUNTY CONVENTION.—The executive committee of the Clackamas County Christian Endeavor Union met at the Congregational church on last Monday evening to begin preparing for the county convention which will meet in Oregon City, October, 23-25, 1906. Mr. W. G. Beattie, the president of the union, will go to Eugene soon to attend the State University and therefore tendered his resignation as president and Rev. A. J. Montgomery was elected to fill the vacancy.

IMPROVISED MUNICIPAL PATROL WAGON.—As Oregon City has no patrol wagon, substitutes are often improvised when an obstreperous drunk is picked up, who cannot be kept on his feet. Sometimes a wheelbarrow is brought into use, but more frequently the two-wheeled hand cart, used to carry mail between the postoffice and railroad depot, serves as a "hurry up" wagon.
