SITUATION AND EXTENT.

It is situated from 42 degrees to 46 George Dorcas, Salem, degrees north latitude, and 116 degrees George H Durham, Portland, 40 minutes to 124 degrees 45 minutes Dr J J Leavitt, Molalia, west longitude. In shape it is an oblong Charles Holman, Meadow Brook, 350 miles east and west, and 275 miles Fred Matthais, wide.

SURFACE.

Mountains.—Oregon is a mountinous L. Bernard, Portland, state. The Cascade range extends Mrs C Newell, north and south the entire lenghth of Geo A Brown, S.F., the state. The highest summit is Mt. It is especially adapted to the production of the cereals, root crops, and fruits. The gold mines of Eastern Oregon are worked to a considerable extent, and the Coast mountains contain valuable coalone of the chief resources of the state,

INDUSTRIES. Agriculture is the leading industriy, and the chief product is wheat, of which many millions of bushels are annually exported.

Manufacturies,-The saw-mills of Oregon produce immence quantities of lumber.

Fisheries.-The salmon fisheries near the mouth of the Columbia, are very extensive, and great quantities of canned | ment plan. salmon are exported. The salmon is the finest in the world.

Commerce.-Wheat, lumber and fish are the leading exports. The chief imports are coffee, tea, and sugar.

EDUCATION.

The public schools of Oregon are of education, consisting of the governor, the secretary of state, and the superintendent of public instructions. Each county has a county superintendent of schools, and each school district has a school board of three members.

POLITICAL DIVISIONS.

Oregon contains thirty-two counties. Pordand, the metropolis is situated on the Willamette river, in Multnomah county

Salem, the capital, is beautifully situated on the Willamette river, in Marion county. HISTORY.


