CHRISTIAN ENDEAVORERS.—The annual convention of the Christian Endeavorers of Clackamas county will be held in the Baptist church in this city commencing this (Friday) evening at 7:30 o'clock with a song service. The address of welcome will be made by C. H. Dye, of this city. The principal address of the evening will be by Rev. A. E. W. Ackerman, of the First Congregational church, Portland. Saturday forenoon will be devoted to business and the afternoon to papers and discussions. Saturday evening Rev. Ray Palmer, of the Second Baptist church, Portland, will deliver the address. Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock will be the Junior rally; and at 7:30 the convention will unite with Holdridge and Dickson in evangelistic services. The people of Oregon City are invited to all these services.

THE Y. M. C. A.—On next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock Rev. Holdridge, the evangelist, will preach an object sermon, sometimes called a "cordwood" sermon. Special music has been arranged for this service and all men are especially invited to be present. The Y. M. C. A. vocal music class, under the direction of Prof. A. F. Werschke, will begin the last term of ten lessons on Tuesday evening. The tuition for the term was 50 cents and all who join now and pay full tuition will be given an extra ticket for the closing entertainment on December 22. Special terms will be made to ladies. The ladies gymnasium has nine members, who manifest great interest in the work and are making rapid advancement. Beginning Wednesday and Friday afternoon from 4 to 6 o'clock.

the bit and received a severe shock. The dislodged wire was removed before further damage was done.
