Mr. Price was born in Wales and at an early age eclisted in the English army, serving in a number of campaigns in India, being in the celebrated defence of Lucknow t was while in India suffering the trials, privations and hardships incident to a soldier's life that he J. W. Cowan the officiating minister. contracted the seeds of the disease, asthma, that ultimately led to complications that caused his death.

Mr. Price arrived in America on May 8, 1890; he lived in Pennsylvania and Oregon City, where he was engaged in Bengamin. the tailoring business. He was a consistent member of the Presbyterian church and a man highly esteemed in the community. He leaves, besides a wife to moorn his loss, six children, four sons and two daughters. The funeral was held at the family residence, corner maining in the postoffice at Oregon City, Monroe and Third street on Monday Oregon, on November 25, 1896; afternoon, conducted in English by Rev. A. J. Montgomery and in Welch by Rev. Mr. Jones, of Beaver Creek.

The remains wer laid to rest in Mountain View cemetery, followed by a large concourse of friends as a token of respect to the family and deceased,
