RYAN'S CONVENTION.

Nominations Made Like Clockwork—Every Fellow Does His Part.

This convention was called to order by Thos. F. Ryan. Geo. A. Harding was chosen chairman and Thos. P. Randall secretary.

A motion by Thos. F. Ryan that the convention nominate a mayor, treasurer, and two councilmen from each ward, prevailed.

E. G. Canfield was placed in nomination for mayor and the secretary instructed to cast the ballot of the convention for him, there being no other nominee.

Mr. Canfield was called upon for a speech and said: "In thanking you for this nomination I can only say, that if I am elected I promise you an honest, economical administration of the city government."

For treasurer, H. E. Straight, the present incumbent, was nominated by acclamation.

The convention then divided into wards to make nominations for councilmen. John Bittner was elected chairman and E. E. Martin secretary of the First ward meeting.

In the Second ward meeting Chas. H. Dye was elected chairman and T. P. Randall secretary. Chas. Babcock and Lewis Robbins were appointed tellers.

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In both ward meetings motions prevailed to declare the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes the nominees.

The convention ratified the nominations made in the ward meetings. On motion Chairman Harding appointed the following campaign committee to act in conjunction with himself and the secretary.

J. W. Moffitt suggested that Mark Hanna be sent for to manage the campaign. The suggestion did not appear to meet the approval of the voters present.

Every thing had been cut and dried before hand and the convention simply ratified the "slate" put up by the bosses.
