

FARM FIELD AND GARDEN

Poultry For Chicago.

Chickens for Chicago should be killed by bleeding in the mouth or opening the veins of the neck. Hang by the feet until properly bled. Leave head and feet on. Do not remove intestines or crop. Scalded chickens sell best to home trade and dry picked best to shippers, so that either manner of dressing will do if properly done. Home, Farm and Fire-side in this connection advises dressing turkeys for Chicago markets in the same manner, except to always dry pick.

Dry picked turkeys always sell best and command better prices than scalded lots, as the appearance is brighter and more attractive. Endeavor to market all old and heavy gobblers before Jan. 1, as after the holidays the demand is for small, fat hen turkeys only, old toms being sold at a discount to canners.

Sugar Beet Pulp For the Silo.

The Chino Champion says that sugar beet pulp is a most excellent material for ensilage. As it comes from the diffuser it is in excellent condition for that purpose and readily settles down tight in the silo, therefore keeping with only a moderate fermentation. It makes its own cover and comes out with less labor than any other form of ensilage. This is a matter of great importance to farmers living near a sugar factory. The pulp is a valuable fodder, but cannot usually be disposed of as fast as it accumulates for immediate feeding.
