#### ENGLISH HIGHWAYS.

HOW THEY ARE BUILT AND MAIN-

Stone Broken by Hand Is Superior to the Product of Rock Crusher - Constant Care Needed to Keep the Surface In Good Condition-Cost of Maintenance.

I have been for 12 years one of the way wardens of this parish, and consequently am thoroughly conversant with the maintenance of roads, though their construction was before my time, says John R. Fox, Devizes, England, in Mexico Independent. We have two classes of road, main and parish. The main roads are 24 feet wide, and were constructed under the old turnpike sysfeet wide, as a rule, of solid stone, 12 inches thick in center and 7 to 8 at tables, with a footpath at each side from 3 to 6 feet in addition.

In the parish road the total width is 20 feet, of which about 12 to 14 is stone and the sides greensward. In all cases the authorities have power to drain the roads into adjacent private property and the landowner must get rid of the surface water as best he can. Our drainage runs through suitable trenches cut in the greensward into the ditches of the private owners parallel with the road on each side, and one of the duties, and not the least important, of the surveyor is to see that these ditches and trenches are kept in good order, so that the read may be always kept dry.

To build a good road the surveyor will first have to shape it and provide for water tables and thorough drainage and then put over the whole road stones broken uniformly to a "rational" size, and these should then be rolled in with a steam roller, if possible, beginning at sides of the road and working toward the center, so as to keep a perfectly uniform curve throughout. The curve must be as slight as possible to carry off the water effectually; if the road is too round, all the traffic will seek the middle of the road, and in three or four menths the road would be what the road men call "dished," Here the water would stand in pools and soon rot the

I may mention that we employ none but hand broken stones of a rational size. They cost about one-half more than we give for machine broken stones, and last twice as long; in fact, we would give double, if necessary, rather than use machine broken stone, because the result is so much more satisfactory. The latter do not bind or consolidate half as well.

It is important that the stone, whatever its nature, be small enough and as uniform in size as possible,

The best road that can be made will soon go to pieces unless it is constantly looked after by some competent man, On the main roads we pay by the day regular road men 2s. 6d. a day, and the parish roads are let in lengths of from three to five miles to laboring men, who do all the work under supervision of the surveyor, but are separately paid for breaking the stone, which is laid down at the side of the road on the sward, in only be amiable and avoid the wearisuitable lots, during the spring and summer, and broken at their convenience before November, when they commence putting it on.
