WORK ON UPPER WILLAMETTE.—The government snagboat Mathinna is at work clearing the Willamette between Corvallis and Harrisburg of its obstructions, the water being too high to permit of operations any further down. A boat now runs to Harrisburg once a week, and there are some 400 tons of wheat yet unsold to be brought down. Captain Hatch has been enabled to get along much more rapidly with the work of improving the river since he was furnished with a more powerful and conveniently arranged boat, and the upper river is now in better condition than ever before.

OUTLOOK FOR FRUIT GOOD.—Fruit Commissioner, Henry E. Doeh for the first district comprising Multnomah, Clackamas, Clatsop, Washington and Tillamook counties says the prospects for a large crop of fruit this season are very encouraging. In fact he says, where there should be one fruit bud, there are two, and, if no untimely rains occur during the time when to pollenization of the fruit blossoms is going on there will be one of the greatest fruit crops ever seen in Oregon.

SECOND ANNUAL CONVENTION.—The 21 annual convention of Sunday school workers of Clackamas county will be held in the Methodist church in Oregon City Wednesday and Thursday, April 14 and 15. An excellent program is being prepared for the occasion.

CORNER-STONE SERVICE.—The corner stone of St. James Episcopal church was laid at St. Helens last Monday by Rev. George B. Van Waters, of St. David's church, Portland. Short addresses were made by Rev. Joseph DeForest, of Oregon City, Rev. Wm. R. Powell, Rev. John W. Simpson and other Episcopal clergymen.

TAX LIST READY.—County Clerk Dixon has completed the extension of the tax roll and turned it over to the sheriff for collection and that officer will be ready to receipt for 1896 taxes next Monday after the county court has approved his special bond of \$50,000 as tax collector, for which purpose the court will meet in special session this (Friday) afternoon.
