COUNTY SCHOOL DIRECTORY.

School Teachers, Number of Scholars
and Clerks in Clackamas County.

From the annual report of Superin-
tendent Starkweather the subjoined facts
relative to the schools of Clackamas
county is given. His report shows that
the number of children in Clackamas
county between the ages of 4 and 20 is
7733. In Oregon City the gain was 1,
in Parkplace-Gladstone 46, in Canemah
7 and in West Oregon City and Willam-
ette Falls 59. There was a loss of 71 in
Oswego, 12 in Milwaukie, and 23 in
Canby. In the following summary the
number of the district appears first, fol-
lowed by the number of children, the
clerk's name, postoffice and teachers
now in the school or soon to begin the
spring term. The districts having no
spring term are so indicated while those
that so far as known have not yet en-
gaged a teacher are left blank.

commended the paper and offered the
suggestion that the next meeting of the
club be made of a historical character.
The idea was well received and it was
decided to have the program in this line
and that all the old pioneers of the
vicinity be invited to be the guests of
the club at their next meeting. The
question for the next debate is Resolved,
That the pioneers of the Pacific coast
displayed greater courage and endured
more hardships than did the pioneers
of the Atlantic coast. The affirmative
will be led by Miss Nora Elliott and the
negative by Miss Dollie Cross. The
regular debate for the evening was then
had on the question, Resolved, That,
the indications point to a longer life for
the American nation than that had by
any other nation, the leaders being
Joseph Garrow and Willie Williams.
The debate was well handled and
showed that the speakers had given close
study to their subject. The decision was
given in favor of the negative by the
judges, Capt. Apperson, Supt. Stark-
weather and Judge Galloway. A vote of
thanks was then extended to Judge and
Mrs. Galloway for their hospitality after
which the club adjourned to meet next
Tuesday evening at the residence of H. E.
Cross.
