OUR SOLDIER BOYS.

F Company in line for inspection—A Splendid Showing Made.

Monday evening F Co. assembled at the armory for quarterly inspection. There were 44 men in line, the other members of the company being either sick or absent from the city. The inspecting officers were Major Sidney Collins, Major L. C. Jones and Capt. T. T. Strain, of the brigade staff from Portland. After a splendidly executed company drill, Major Collins took charge of the company and gave the boys a very rigid inspection, looking carefully as to the condition of their arms and accoutrements and personal appearance. At the close of the inspection he complimented Capt. Kelly very highly on the splendid shape in which he found the company. The inspection over Lieut. McKens then put the company through an extended order drill, the various orders in the skirmish line work being given by bugle call. The many and difficult evolutions which were carried out during the evening were executed in a manner highly creditable to the officers and men and showed that F Co. is fully capable of sustaining its position in the regiment and that in actual service it would be found fully prepared for the duties of the field.

There were some 75 guests present to witness the inspection and drill and they were greatly pleased with the fine appearance our soldier boys presented.
