FROM SOUTHERN OREGON.-Clarence Knott, a former resident of Mulino, returned Tuesday, accompanied by his wife, from Southern Oregon, where he has been residing for sometime past. Mr. Knott has been engaged in placer mining at Gold Hill, but says there is a great deal more lottery than profit in the business. The largest clean-up he ever made in any one day was \$5.01 and neglected to state the smallest amount taken. The cost of living is very much higher there than here and it is only now and then that a person strikes it rich and Julia A and J H Hickman to Kate makes anything out of the mining business. The farming section of Southern Oregon, he says, cannot be compared with the Willamette Valley owing to the limited productions of that section. Potatoes are a luxury, only being found on the tables of the wealthy. The freight | Zeph G Dunn to Philip Chaperon rates of that section are so exhorbitant that what little the farmer has to sell is consumed in the shipping. The climate he says is also very much over rated. It rained and snowed almost continually during the winter and when he left there last Monday the thermometer stood at 94 J D and E A Lee to Milton W in the shade and was still going up. Mr, Knott says that if he could have a Willamette Valley farm located down in Southern Oregon with the market found in this valley he could be a millionaire in five years.

SIDEWALK ADVERTISING -A stranger visiting Oregon City for the first time, especially if he were fresh from the cyclone districts of the East, would think Main street had been visited by a fullgrown Oklahoma cyclone. The sidewalks are lined with oil tanks, flour, 7x9 feet dry goods boxes, crates of cabbage, cord-wood, sacks of onions, pails of jelly, tool chests, cook stoves, hay rakes, rocking chairs, bales of hay and straw, farm plows, boxes of fish, harrows, beer kegs, cultivators, etc. There is a city ordinance prohibiting the obstructing of the sidewalks with merchandise but the city authorities have been very lenient with the business men and they have trespassed upon their privilege and if the practice is not stopped before another year the sidewalks will be impassible. The peculiar thing about the whole custom is that those merchants who contend that advertising does not pay monopolize the most sidewalk space in the display of their goods.

WORKMAN INJURED .- James Alexander, an employe of the Pacific Bridge Company, was struck on the head and chest with a block and tackle just before quitting time Tuesday evening, suffering concussion of the brain and sustaining internal injuries. He was borne across the bridge on a stretcher to the office of Drs. 
