Young People's Alliance.

The sixth annual convention of the conference branch, Y. P. A. of the Oregon conference convened in the Canby Evangelical church April 19 and 20, 1897.

The evening session was opened at 7:30 with devotional services led by Rev. R. D. Streiffeler. The president, Rev. G. A. Marshardt, not doing present, the vice-president took the chair.

The different committees were then appointed and the delegates of the alliances gave their reports.

After a short testimony meeting the convention adjourned, to meet at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

On Tuesday morning one-half hour was devoted to religious exercises, after which the program was taken up. On roll call 32 delegates representing 16 alliances answered to their names.

The subject "A Plan for More Systematic Missionary Work in our Alliances" was opened by Mr. J. A. Siewert, and further discussed by different members of the convention.

Rev. G. Koch read a paper on "The Present Status of Young People's work in the Church" in which he gave many interesting facts and incidents.

Mr. Schnerer read a paper entitled "The Model Monthly Meeting" in German and it was pronounced a treat by those who were able to understand it.

The afternoon session was opened by devotional services conducted by Rev. R. D. Streiffeler.

An excellent essay was read by Miss Lena Royal, of Salem, entitled "To What extent can Our Young People Engage in Popular Amusement?" in which she emphasized the advisability and usefulness of innocent amusements, but scathingly denounced dancing, theater-going, card-playing etc. as being detrimental and destructive in their influence.

A paper was then read by Rev. A. Meyers, entitled "Our Past, Present and Future" in which he spoke of the prosperity of the alliance, our number being 30,470 and the necessity of vital godliness. The essay was pregnant with spiritual treasures.

A paper on "Y. P. A. Camp-meetings, Should we Have Them?" by F. C. Streiffeler of Portland was listened to with great interest.

An essay entitled, "Best Method of Maintaining Interest in Y. P. A. in Rural Districts" read by Miss Fruinag of Tigardville was also very interesting.

Miss Nettie Crosby of Mouthout then read a paper entitled "How to Conduct a Junior Y. P. A." which contained many excellent thoughts and ideas.

The following officers were elected: President, Rev. Maurer; vice-president, Rev. L. Anderson; secretary, Miss Nettie Crosby; cor. secretary, Mr. Adolph Bittner; treasurer, Miss Rachel Graham.

In the evening Bishop S. C. Breyfloger gave a lecture on "Glimpses of Europe Through American Eyes." The lecture was greatly appreciated by the audience, giving them as it did a very clear insight into the social and religious conditions prevailing in the European countries.
