A HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.

A Portland Street Car Takes a Fearful Plunge—Four Persons Killed.

A frightful street-car accident occurred at 6:45 Tuesday morning, on East Morrison street, between Eighth and Ninth, involving the death of three persons and the injury, more or less severely, of nearly a score of people. Car 52, of the City & Suburban line, running between Mount Tabor and the West Side, in charge of Conductor Stephen Guthrie, with John G. Kieffer as motorman, jumped the track while crossing a bridge at high speed, and dashing over the roadway through the frail wooden guards built for the protection of pedestrians, and plunged into a slough of water 20 feet below.

Those in the accident who escaped death say the car was being run at a fearful rate. One front axle was broken. The dead and injured are as follows:

William W. Blanchard, of Sunnyside, 48 years of age; assistant miller at Acme mills. Katherine Baile, 25 years of age; until recently of Illinois. Newton Hansen, of Sunnyside, 16 years of age; employed at Great Eastern Tea company.

THE INJURED.

Adelbert Matteson, of Tabor Heights; manager Palette printing office; left arm broken; at good Samaritan hospital. Stephen Guthrie, conductor of car; left arm broken; face badly bruised; at Good Samaritan hospital. Robert Thompson, of Mount Tabor, apprentice at Portland Electric Company; slightly injured. Michael Frison, of Montavilla; slightly bruised about head. Melchior Bauninger; lives near Prettymann station; employed in Oregon furniture factory; shoulder-blade dislocated, and thought to have sustained internal injuries. Andrew Gatzka, of Sunnyside, newsboy; slightly injured about head. George E. Howell, porter at Lang & Co's, wholesale grocers; lives at 1980 East Taylor street; slight scalp wounds. Lizzie Lorenz, employed at Troy laundry; lives near Glenwood station; slightly injured about head. Louis Larsen, Sunnyside; pressman at Marsh Printing Company; right arm and body bruised. Charles C. Miller, of Sunset Park; of Miller Smith & Co., grocers; injured about head, neck and back; not seriously. J. N. Casey, 111 East 35th street; clerk William Gadsby's furnishing house; slightly injured. J. C. Butler, engineer, 1067 East Morrison street; slightly injured. Earl Hunter, Sunnyside; slightly injured. Charles M. Atwood, painter; lives at 170 East 34th street; slightly injured. R. O. Collis, harnessmaker; lives at 994 East Morrison street; injured about head. Ed. Larsen, Sunnyside; right arm broken, and sustained injuries about chest. D. B. Ulbrand, 1105 East Main street; employed in Northwest Door Company; right collar-bone broken; chest bruised. J. B. True, grocer, 123 First street; hip injured slightly.

LATER.—Michael Benninger, an employee of the Oregon Furniture Company, is dead, through injuries received in the dreadful plunge of car 52 into the East Morrison-street slough.
