**TO BOOM THE CONVENTIONS.**—L. Adams of Portland, chairman of the social committee of the local union of Christian Endeavor, was in Oregon City Sunday arranging for the union meeting to be held in the First Congregational church of that city next Tuesday evening, May 11, to arrange for excursions to the state C. E. convention at Eugene, May 13 to 16, and the international convention at San Francisco, July 7 to 12, and also to arrange for the reception and entertainment of Eastern Endeavorers who will visit Portland and vicinity on their way home from San Francisco. Mr. Adams says that even at this early date all the rooms in the Portland hotel are engaged from the 16th to the 19th of July by parties who expect to stop over at the metropolis on their way home. A good program of music and addresses has been arranged for this meeting and Oregon City Endeavorers and their friends are urged to be present and participate in the meeting.

**FEW STRAWBERRIES.**—From fruit growers who have studied the fruit situation thoroughly it is learned that the strawberry crop, the earliest fruit in the Willamette valley, will be from 50 to 65 per cent. short this year. This is the case, not only in the immediate neighborhood of Salem and the hills south of the city, but the same conditions exist in the neighborhood of Albany, and further south. It is thought that the reason of this shortage is not the result of climatic conditions existing this spring, but rather that it is caused by the heavy frosts last fall, when the tender plants suffered from the excessive cold. This is the only fruit that thus far has been reported as having any other but the brightest prospects in the Willamette valley this year, every other fruit tree or shrub promising a most bountiful yield.—Statesman.

**A BUSY DAY.**—The Yamhill Independent has the following to say about Dr. Cowan, who preached in Newburg last Sunday: "Rev. J. W. Cowan, who preached at the Friends church last Sunday morning and evening, is a very earnest and interesting speaker. His text for the morning sermon was Gal. 6:2. As he treated of the interdepen-

dence of mankind and the need of bearing one another's burdens, his hearers were many of them impressed as perhaps never before with the privileges and responsibilities of life. His evening subject was no less interesting and instructive. He also talked to the Junior Endeavorers at 3 o'clock and addressed the Y. M. C.
