Died.

WELSH—At the home of his son in Highland, Friday, July 2, 1897, of paralysis, George Welsh, aged 78 years and 7 months.

Mr. Welsh was born in Maryland Dec. 10, 1818. He lived in that state until the gold discovery in California in 1848. He then left his native state to try his fortune in the wide west. In 1853 he came to Oregon and settled in Highland where he has since resided.

In 1848 he was married to Miss Orpha Jones. The fruits of this marriage were two sons and two daughters. Mrs. Mary Kirk, of Orville, Calif., Mrs. Caroline Gard, of Oregon City, and Frank and Charles Welsh, of Highland, besides numerous grand-children.

The first great sorrow of Mr. Welsh's life was the death of his much-loved wife on August 12, 1860.

Mr. Welsh was stricken with paralysis July 1, 1894 and has since been an invalid. He took several trips to California in hopes a change of climate might be beneficial. However no relief came until he passed through the valley of death. He was a good citizen and a loved father and neighbor. He was kind and thoughtful of others, honorable and just in all his dealings.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Crane at the Highland cemetery the remains being laid beside those of his wife. The funeral was the largest ever known in this place. The floral pieces were beautiful and numerous.

Father, we will miss you greatly. But we know you are at rest; You have gone before and left us. May we meet you 'mong the blest.
