FROM FORT KLAMATH.

Newsy Letter From the Welch-Cheney Touring Party.

FORT KLAMATH, Tuesday July 20.—We are having a lovely time. Have had some very hard work connected with our journey but nevertheless we are all contented and feel well repaid for our troubles. Last evening I went out in one of the marshes here and brought down seven nice birds which we had a part of for supper. They were very nice as we had not had any meat except bacon for some time.

This Klamath country is the grandest country we have seen since leaving Albany. From Portland to Albany, we think, can't be beat, the farms being better cared for and the buildings far ahead of anything we have seen since leaving Linn county.

First day, leaving home, we drove to Gervais, a little town in Marion county of which perhaps you all know, where we made our first camp, having travelled 30 miles. June 28th, left Gervais at 6 a. m., reaching Salem about 10 a. m. where we got our dog which has proved very useful around camp. Continuing on the way until 5 p. m. we camped within a few miles of Jefferson beside a little brook which was one of the prettiest camping places we have had. Here we came near losing Latourette who rolled out of bed into a ditch during the night and when found was nearly frozen. During the night one of our horses got tangled in the rope and was nearly strangled when the barking of the dog aroused us. Here our artist, Cheney, tried hard to get a picture by flash light but we managed to evade him. June 29th, we passed through some of the prettiest agricultural country on the whole trip.

Wheat looked as though it would easily yield forty bushels to the acre, and nearly ready to cut. This day we made quite a drive, passing through Albany and camping a little south of Tangent, a little place on the S. P. road ten miles from Albany. June 30th, from two miles south of Tangent to within a few miles of Eugene nothing of importance occurred. Country not so good, dry, sandy and a great many rocks. July 1, drove into Eugene, a very pretty town with some fine business houses, did some trading and had some blacksmithing done on the wagon. This night it rained quite hard which helped the roads as they had not had much rain. Traveled on to within five miles of Cottage Grove, a place of perhaps 1500 inhabitants, kept up principally by mining; very poor agricultural country. From Cottage Grove we soon struck the Calapoia mountains where Harding and I walked 20 miles one day and camped at a place called Oakland, a hamlet of about 500 people who were celebrating on July 31. Reaching Roseburg on July 4, we found a nice town and some pretty good country but nothing to compare with the Willamette Valley. July 5th, traveled to Myrtle Point, a little place of 150 people on the S. P. Here we met a farmer who said he thought we could get a deer if we would camp at his place, so we went back half a mile, crossed the Umpqua river and stayed over a couple of days without seeing even the track of a deer. So far we had not caught any fish and many a time, even up to reaching Klamath, we wished we had went up the Abernethy as we surely would have had as much and probably more game. Country mountainous, with little places of few acres down in the valleys, but they do not raise anything as we could not even buy hay half the time. Traveling along this way until July 9th, we reached Grants Pass, a mining town. This country is not adapted to agriculture or fruit. After leaving Grants Pass, traveling up Rogue river, we saw some fine fruit farms and bought nice peaches at 10 cents a peck. Along Rogue river we had some good fishing, catching one 18½ inches long. We did not get any deer, there being none in this country to speak of. On July 10th at noon, we reached Crater lake, one of the grandest bodies of water I ever saw—but that is all. Lots of snow, cold weather, no game, no fish and nothing in the line of edibles but mosquitoes, so we soon left this place and are now camping in Klamath valley, a beautiful prairie devoted mostly to stock raising and dairying. The grass is nearly a foot high and thick all over the prairie. Every farm is irrigated, as the water facilities are so handy, there being several large streams flowing through the valley whose banks are nearly on a level with the surrounding country. We expect to remain here several days. On August 1st, we go to Klamath Falls to meet Mr. E. E. Charman who is to join us at that place and go home around by Crater Lake, from there to Prineville, across the Lebanon route where we will find some good fishing and hunting, expecting to reach home about September 1st.

Bill of fare for this evening:
First Course.—Game soup, slices of bacon

a la Genoise, fried slices of trout. Entrees—Duck's liver and bacon, sweet bread. Second course.—Roast duck, boiled ham and beans, fried potatoes with onions. Third course.—Prune pudding, apple jelly, prune pie. Dessert.—Fresh peaches. Coffee, milk and water.
