**WEST OREGON CITY SCHOOL.**—The West Oregon City school board held a meeting Wednesday and selected Prof. T. J. Gary for principal and Miss Norma Fox for intermediate and Miss Olive Lewelling for primary teacher. Prof. Gary for six years has been the principal of the Milwaukie school and has built up a record as one of the best educators in Clackamas, and the West Side district was fortunate in securing his services, though his Milwaukie friends will be sorry to lose him for he had been re-elected as principal of their school. Miss Fox's re-election was a compliment to her ability as a teacher, she having taught for the last two years in this school. Miss Lewelling, who is a daughter of County Recorder Lewelling, is an experienced teacher and a recent graduate of the Monmouth Normal school. The school is to begin the first Monday in September. The school building will hereafter be heated by hot air the necessary apparatus having recently been put in at a cost of over \$400.

**SHOT IN THE ARM.**—Lee Harding, who accidentally shot himself at Crater lake last Tuesday, July 20, while trying to shoot some ducks, arrived home on the overland Friday morning. At the time the accident happened he was standing with his revolver in his hand on some poles when they turned with him and in trying to save himself the revolver was discharged, the bullet entering his left hand at the wrist and ranging upward, lodging near the elbow. Some physicians happened to be camped in the vicinity and they extracted the bullet and dressed the wound. The wound is healing rapidly and soon the memory of it only will remain. Lee left Oregon City the latter part of June in company with Dr. J. W. Welch and E. S. Cheney for a tour of Southern Oregon and was having an excellent time when this unfortunate accident cut his outing short. The remainder of the party will be absent some time yet.

## FIRE AT THE WOOLEN MILL

### Picking Room and Machine Shop Destroyed Wednesday Morning.

The clanging of the fire bell and blowing of the woolen mill whistle disturbed the early morning slumbers of Oregon City people about 5 a. m. Wednesday and in an incredibly short time a great crowd of people had gathered at the scene of the conflagration at the woolen mills.

The fire originated in the building used for a dye house, picking room, boiler room and machine shop and is supposed to have been the result of spontaneous combustion from the pipes in the dye room. It was first discovered by Bob Wilkinson, one of the night weavers, who saw the flames suddenly burst from the west end of the building. The fire was discovered a few minutes after Julius Grasier, the night watchman, who had made his final round for the night and was just in the act of putting the last peg in his register when the alarm was sounded.

The several fire companies responded quickly, considering the fact that most of the members were at their homes and soon had a number of streams playing upon the fire. Owing to the inflammable material in the building the fire companies were unable to put out the fire but by heroic efforts succeeded in confining it to the building where it originated.

The loss to the Oregon City Manufacturing Co. is between \$20,000 and \$25,000, only about two-thirds of which was covered by insurance. All the machinery and apparatus was totally destroyed, together with a large amount of raw material and chemicals used in dyeing. The loss falls heavily on the company just at this time since they were running night and day in their endeavor to fill orders and this will delay them very materially.

The mills will be shut down next week and the work of rebuilding the structure commenced. The company will also put in new water wheels during the shut down.

During the administration of S. R. Green as chief of the fire department, the council purchased 750 feet of "Live Oak" hose, and whenever a fire occurs there is always a scramble among the firemen as to who shall have this hose. It is not only very light and pliable but stronger and more easily handled than any other hose. It was purchased through the company's agent, N. R. Lang.
